CLASS





"GUIDANCE COUNSELORS"

West Chicago Community High School has two guidance counselors, one for freshmen (Mr. Schwartz) and one for the upper classmen (Mr. DeLap). Both teachers and students may make use of this guidance service in order to understand better the students' problems so as to aid in their solution. When a student wishes to talk to a counselor, the procedure is to make an appointment a day or two ahead of time to assure adequate time for the conference.

When a student graduates from eighth grade, the first step in his enrollment in high school is a talk with the counselor. This is to help the student decide what curriculum to take (College Preparatory or Vocational). After making this important decision, the student must decide which courses to take. For all students three years of English, three years of social studies, and four years of physical education are required. The rest of the courses may be selected from a variety of subjects, depending upon the student's needs. The counselor will keep in touch with the student throughout his high school career, having talks every so often.

Throughout the counseling and testing programs, student preferences, aptitudes, and achievements are studied. Test information is interpreted for students and parents to aid students in selecting proper careers and in making sound adjustments. Accurate records are kept on each individual student to help him in filling out applications for college or employment. The guidance department also administers various state and school tests given to students in groups.

There are many reasons for seeing your counselor: for curriculum selection, class failures, test results, home and school adjustments, jobs, college selection, graduation requirements, changes of schedules, etc. It is very important for each and every student to take advantage of the counseling services available to them while in high school.






MATH


Further courses in math include Math IV, from a continuation of geometry to some polynomial calculus and Math V is an advanced applied mathematics primarily for pre-college students.


eral study of chemistry, physics, astronomy, geology, and atomic energy.


Boys' P.E.


CLASS


