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'Wini' Saluted on Eve of Retirement


Miss Winifred Thomassen, who spent 33 years of her 35-year career in education at West Chicago High School, will be retiring at the end of the school year. At various times she served as teacher, dean of girls, and as administrative assistant. It is in the latter role that she has been known to most current We-Go students.

On the eve of her retirement, Miss Thomassen was saluted by Dr. Jerald Saimon, Superintendent of District 94, and Dr. Richard Kamm, principal, as a person of unusual efficiency and dedication.

"I've never met anyone more dedicated and persevering," Dr. Saimon said. "Wini will be missed by a great many people. She is one of the kindest and most generous persons I know. She is the kind of person that we are proud to say that we knew!"

Dr. Kamm also paid tribute to Miss Thomassen's competence and dedication. "She was especially helpful to me when I came here a few years ago. As I look back on it now, I can't imagine how I would have gotten along without her!"

Miss Thomassen's decision to retire was something of an emotional experience, she admitted, because she had spent more than half her life working for District 94. Now that she has been in the school system for 35 years, she is eligible for pension benefits.

"I think West Chicago Community High School has always been a good high school," she said. "I think when changes have been in order, changes have been made. The Board of Education is in tune with the times, in my opinion, and has provided good teachers for the youngsters of the school district."

In the time that Miss Thomassen has been at We-Go the size of the school has more than doubled. She said that one of the things she misses in a large school is the contact with the students. "I used to know every student and every student knew me," she said.

A graduate of Illinois State University, Normal, Miss Thomassen started teaching business courses at We-Go in 1943. Later she became dean of girls while still continuing as a teacher. In 1971, she took the post of administrative assistant. Before coming to West Chicago, she taught for two years in Cooksville, a small town in central Illinois.

"I feel very proud of the fact that I come from a family of school teachers," she said. Miss Thomassen and three of her sisters combined have taught more than 100 years in Illinois public schools. "I kind of grew up with the idea that school teaching is a great career," she said.

Miss Thomassen said that she would like to find a parttime job for next year, but right now her plans are indefinite. However, she said, "I don't plan to go home and sit in a rocking chair!"

Rebuttal from Dr. Kamm

I would like to reply to a letter to the editor in the April 30, 1976 edition of the Bridge. The subject of the letter was the availability of certain assembly programs to students.

The letter expressed regret that all students were not able to hear the Linmar High School Choir that performed here on April 23.

I also regret this, but there is a rather logical explanation. Although we wanted them to, the choir was not able to stay long enough to do two or three performances as the University of Illinois Varsity Men's Glee Club, Mime Group, and others have done. In order to enable all students to hear the group at one performance we would have had to move into the gym, an alternative that was unacceptable because of the gym's poor acoustics, the impossibility of using lighting effects (an integral part of the Linmar choir's presentation) and the necessity to

disrupt many P.E. classes for bleacher set-up and take-down time.

Beyond the logistical problems connected with using a gym for a musical performance, there is no doubt in my mind regarding the advisability of requiring all students to come to any assembly programs of this kind. True, the choir was excellent, but not all students are interested in hearing choirs, and disinterested students make poor audiences. I would much rather strive to present more and varied programs which are offered, whenever possible, two or more periods, and then allow teachers, classes, and individual students with unscheduled time to choose to attend if they consider the program relevant and interesting to them.
