

Dr. Richard Kamm announced several educational changes scheduled or in planning for the near future.

The board of education has approved these curriculum changes for West Chicago:

1) The English department will start a new course on science fiction: two of their literature courses, Major European Writers.

Home economics will start a new course on clothing careers.

3) The Illinois Office of Education plans a statewide program on "Responsible Education." This program will involve 50 to 60 schools throughout the state. West Chicago is one of the schools asked to participate.


Various schools will pool ideas. Some of the topics to be discussed will be citizenship, politics, particularly voting and personal responsibility. Dr. Kamm feels that although this program will be tough and difficult to teach, it will be worth while.

4) Building plans and designs are progressing well.

5) Tentative plans include a "school in a school" for seniors. Teachers involved in the plans are Mr. George Strecker, Mr. Dean Burgess, Mr. Steve Arnold and Miss Kathy Hayes. The three men recently attended a conference in Quincy, IL., where six alternative schools for juniors and seniors operate successfully in one complex. The meeting was primarily to

pool ideas. There are three basic classroom systems: The traditional system, which most classes follow; A flexible system, midway between the two others; and the type similar to the system taught in Mr. Strecker's history courses which stresses independent education. This involves an individualized personal curriculum, which promotes responsibility. major goal of this program is a different atmosphere in student-student and studentteacher relationship.

The longer I have been at West Chicago High School (3 years now), the prouder I have become of the school. I hope that you share this pride and will join me in an effort to use our school wisely and to take good care of it.
