WCCHS undergoes state school inspection

Two inspectors from the Illinois Office of Education visited our school several weeks ago. This office inspects each public school in the state to determine whether it conforms to State laws and regulations and can therefore be recognized by the State. If a school is not recognized, it will not receive state funding.

Contrary to what many people may think, a great deal of the rules and regulations which govern our school do not come from the District 94 Board of Education, but are generated at the State level. The State Board has developed regulations connected with Education Laws under what is commonly known as Document 1. It gives requirments dealing with every as-

pect of schools and delegates a certain amount of authority to the local Boards for specific descisions. State regluations include the number of days in a school year, and the 1½ mile rule for bus riders.

The inspectors spend two full days in and around the school. They evaluate it in three basic areas. The first

Exciting New Alternative Offered for Seniors

On December 1, Juniors in American History classes were presented with a unique new school program. The product of a year's work by four teachers in our school, this new course of study will be open to all Seniors and will be offered beginning in the 1978-79 school year.

The Senior Option is presented as an "academic alternative," a structural change allowing students to experience an unparalleled kind of learning. The program is exceptional in that it is a) interdisciplinary, b) independant study, c) invidualized, and d) involves community resources outside of the school environment.

The four teachers, Mr. Arnold, Mr. Burgess, Mr. Owens, and Mr. Strecker developed the Senior Option on the belief that many course subjects are interrelated, and should therefore be examined

from several different points of view. They also felt that a student might learn more when studying something of his own choosing. They saw that access to resources in the community at large could be an important element in learning. They concluded that the three principles could be combined to mold an individualized kind of program. Topics dealt with could range anywhere from Mechanics to Death and Dying. Senior Option would be, they felt, more interesting, more involving, and more educational.

Students who sign up for the Option may attend two classes of their own choosing during 1st and 2nd hours, and will then devote the remainder of the day to the Option. By doing so, they will earn credit as follows: English 1, PE ½, Sociology 1, Science 1, Psychology ½, Political Science ½ and Government ½.

During the first semester, students will learn skills necessary to deal with an interdisciplinary approach. These will include interpersonal contact and various communication skills. Students will gain fundamental knowledge in areas of Sociology, Psychology, PE, Government, and Science. They will also develop contracts to understand expectations for their later independent work.

Second semester, the emphasis on the completion of the individually constructed contracts. They will meet these by working both inside and outside the school to find and experience things and people relevant to their topic. Students will meet weekly with the instructors and will participate in weekly group meetings.

Any questions about the Option are welcome and may be directed to Mr. Arnold in 149, Mr. Strecker in 148, Mr. Owens in 247, or Mr. Burgess in 321.

is staff. This is done before the actual visit by scanning the credentials of every staff person in the school.

Program is the second area analyzed. The inspectors make sure that courses required by the State are offered. They also make sure that the content of every course meets the guidelines set.

The third area involves the physical condition of the school. The building is scrutinized for compliance with safety requirements and putlic health standards. This includes floors and fire extinguishers.

At the end of the visit, the inspectors conferred verbally with Dr. Saimon and Dr. Kamm to discuss any questions or possible problems. In a few weeks, a full written report will be sent to the school. The BRIDGE will then have access to the specifics of the actual evaluation findings.
