If a group of 100% male membership turned out Heart's material on second thought that couldn't happen. No self-respecting record company would give a contract to a bunch of bland musicians that intended to romp through the game of "Let's Be Led Zeppelin

for a day", unless, of course, the band leaders happen to be a pair of pretty sisters.

Depending on how one looks at it, "Magazine" contains either two or three covers. No, Heart's painful concert rendition of (who else?) Zep's "Rock 'n' Roll" isn't here. "I've Got the Music in Me" arrives new and improved, but it's still a horrible song. "Without You" showcases Ann's grand voice and supplies one of the record's high points. Sculptor hides in guise of history teacher

An "avocation" is the word Mr. Getz uses to describe his pastime - making junk sculpture.

Mr. Getz, a history teacher at WCCHS, has been making metal sculptures since he won an award in an art show nine years ago.

During the summer he displays and sells his creations at five or six art shows, and he has also received various commissions to create sculptures that are made out of the products a company manufactures.

Mr. Getz uses pieces of farm machinery, nuts, bolts, and just about anything else that sparks his imagination. Although he works mostly in metal, he has experimented with glass, wood, leather, and plastics. His pieces range in size from sparkplug-grasshoppers to a submarine-

play-sculpture located in a shopping center in Indianapolis.

Often his sculptures start with one part in which he can see a potential for a figure or an animal. Then he "finds" other parts to make a total sculpture. During the welding process, each of Mr.

Getz's creatures and objects evolve their own personality, although he insists that it is not planned. Most of his works are realistic, but he has done a few abstracts.

The senior class has commissioned Mr. Getz to make a sculpture as the class gift of 1978.

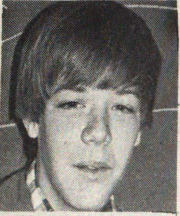

Maybe next year.

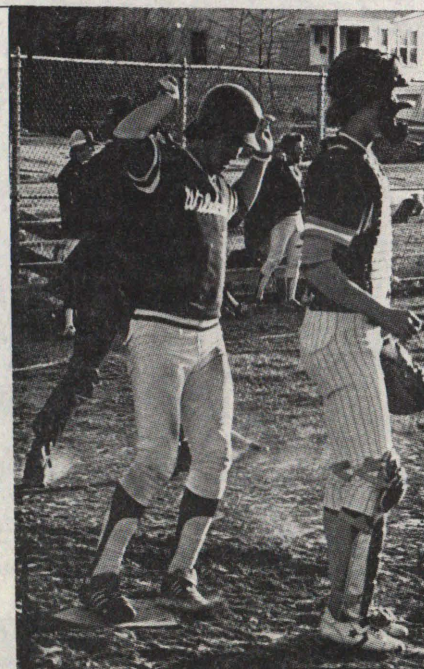

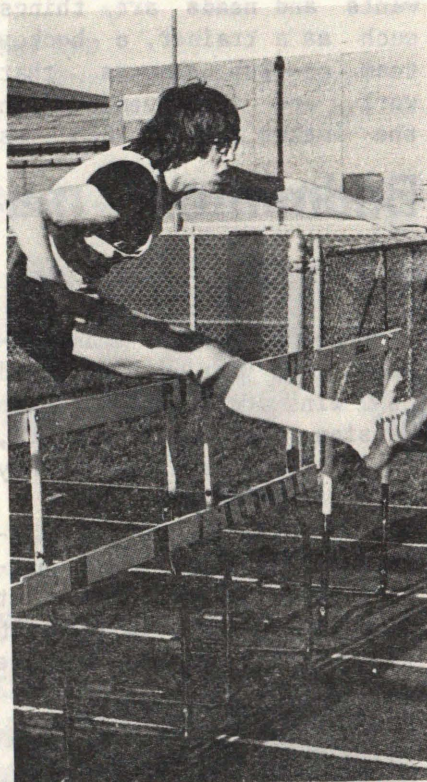
Dean Burgeson the other point getter ran the 800 meter race for a fifth place. We-Go finish with a three way tie for 16th out of 26 teams.
