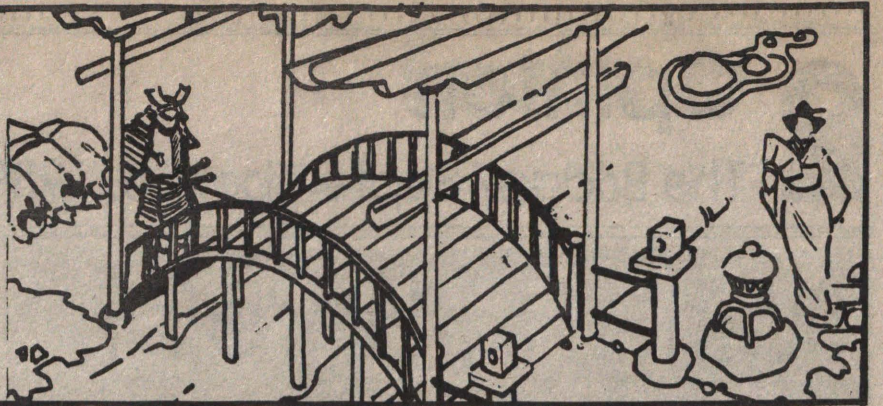

WCCHS is top rated

A recent study completed at Illinois State University named West Chicago High School as one of the 21 most "efficient" high schools in the state.

A professor at the university, Dr. Alan Hickrod, came to this conclusion from studying the ACT scores of high school students throughout Illinois. From researching these scores he found that 21 of 114 high schools in the state have better than expected scores based on their economic background.

West Chicago Superintendent, Dr. Richard Kamm told the *West Chicago Press*, "We're very pleased with the results of the study. While there are limitations to the study in that it uses scores of a test taken by mainly college bound students, it does give us some evidence that we're doing some important things right."

As well as having many of the smartest students in the state, WCCHS seems to be passing on many encouraging things to other area high school. The administration of District 94 has aggressive recruitment for the best teachers and high expectations

within the curriculum aimed at the students.

Downers Grove High School was also named in the top 21 schools. Assistant Superintendent William Renner at Downers Grove and former principal of WCCHS feels that he was hired there because of the excellent results West Chicago was having as a school overall.

Administrators at West Chicago High School are very proud of this outcome and are striving to keep the level of education at the top.

ACT revised

For the first time in 30 years Juniors and Seniors at WCCHS and other schools across the country will be facing a revised edition of the American College Test, ACT, come this October. Omitted will be the science and social studies tests, replaced by science problem solving and reading comprehension.

Reasons given for the changes are such that the emphasis is being shifted to reasoning skills from just simple knowledge.

However, the changes made do not satisfy all critics. Some still believe the test is still biased with white males scoring higher than women, blacks, and Hispanics.

While the bulk of the ACT testing is changing, the scoring will basically remain the same. For example, a person with a composite score of 23 on the old ACT would receive a grade of 24 on the new ACT, which is approximately the same score.

According to *Newsweek* magazine, the Scholastic Aptitude Test, SAT, is also planning to make some revisions to keep up with its main competitor, the ACT. These plans may include essay questions replacing the usual multiple choice questions.

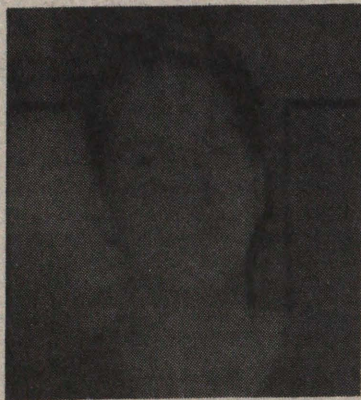

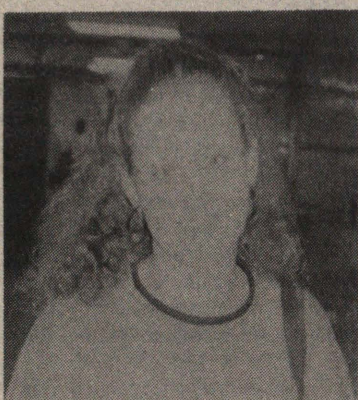
What is your favorite improvement made to the school building?



(Senior) Christy D'Aquila "I think the new bleachers and floor in the gym are a lot brighter. It used to make me feel so gloomy."



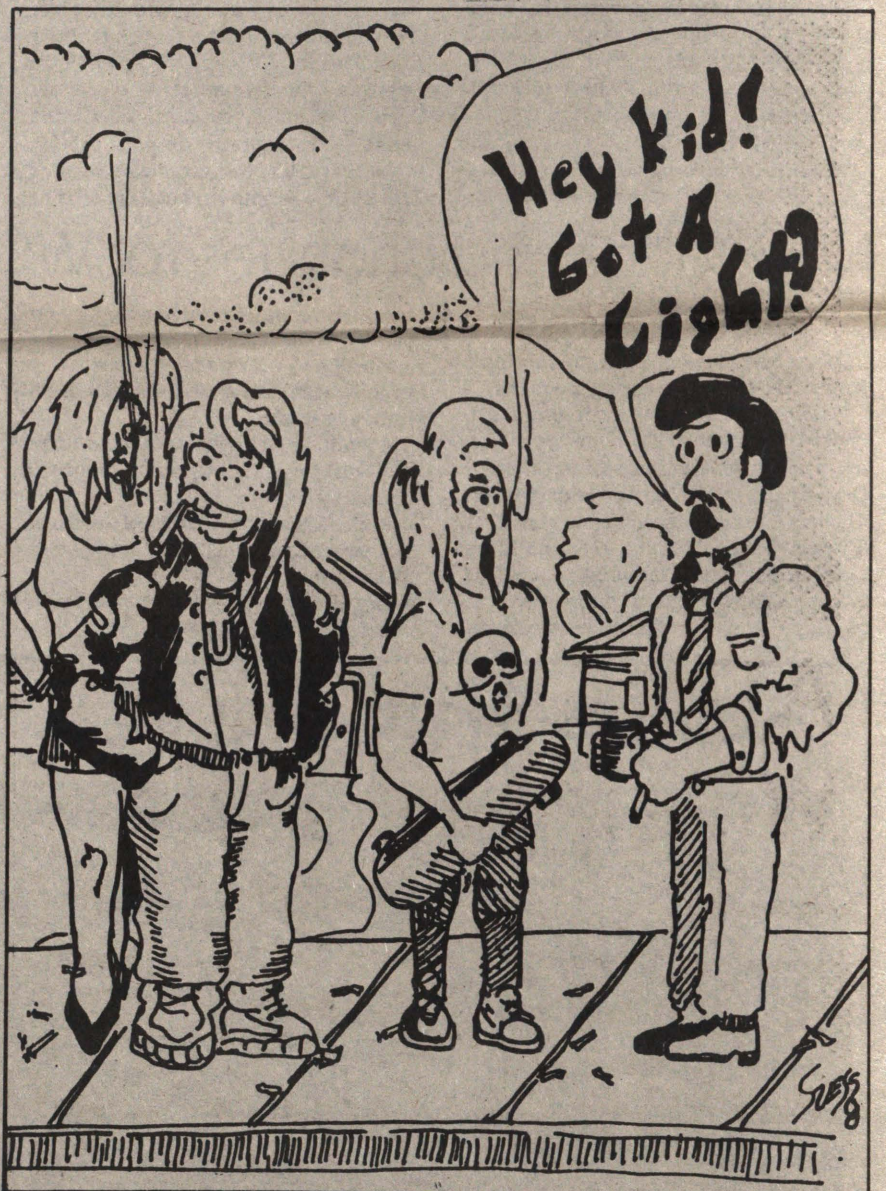
(Junior) Brian Koslovski feels that the fact that P.E. students no longer have to wear P.E. uniforms is real "awesome dude!"

Will we ever get better?

A winning season is what Head Coach Bruce Donash envisions for this 1989-1990 football season. If this year turns out to be a successful season it would be the first one in a long long time.

Despite last years 1-8 season where the only time they won was against Glenbard South and in the 2-7 season the only wins were against Geneva and Glenbard South, Donash and the rest of the team feel optimistic about the season that lies ahead. Donash feels that a win against Geneva will ultimately set the tone for the rest of the season. Senior Chris Nippert feels that in order for Wego to do well this year the team really needs faculty and team support and interest.

In the past there have been several problems that may have attributed to the

performance record of previous teams. Nippert feels that part of the reason is that there has never been any unity and that the seniors and juniors basically did their own thing. Graduated senior Brian Radkiewicz, who now plays football at Western University said, "There isn't enough dedication in the school's spirit. A lot of people could go to the games but didn't. Everybody put the team down because of the history of the team and nobody put any dedication in it." Graduated senior Mike Moffatt views the problem is in size. "We do have the number of kids like Wheaton North and Wheaton Central so we can pretty much pick and choose. Our problem is that we just get enough people for just one team and maybe a special team." Moffatt feels that Wego has at least freshness, size and weight.

Speaking from personal experience, after appointing a new head coach for the football

team a few years back, Coach Shepard from Waubonsie Valley and former Wego head coach believes that the problem lies in the newly introduced coaching system. Shepard said that it takes a good year to introduce a new system to the players, and that it will just take some time. Shepard also views the problem is in the conference that Wego is in. "I just don't think that Wego can compete with the Naperville," Shepard said. "So for enrollment purposes I think Wego is in the wrong conference." Naperville Central has an enrollment of 2400, Naperville North has 1615, Wheaton North has 1550, Wego has the lowest with 1300. To remedy this Shepard suggests that either Wego leaves the DVC and the Naperville stay or vice versa.

Donash agrees that part of the problem is the newly introduced coaching system, but feels that the team will adapt well this year.

"There are an awful lot of people in the community and in the school that feel Wego cannot compete in the DVC," Donash said. Another reason was that he said that the team lacks consistency. "An example of this is when we played Naperville North." Donash pointed out, "We were tied 7-7 with two minutes left in the half. At half time the score was 14-7. We played a solid first half but ran out of gas in the second half. Part of the reason is mental. There is a lack of depth and many (players) got tired in the second half because some players had to play on both offense and defense. This year we are going to emphasize conditioning."

Some individuals that might help the team to a successful season this year are Steve Klingberg at quarterback, Ed Gonzalez at halfback, senior Matt Snell at fullback, senior transfer Steve Heeter as offensive lineman, and seniors Chad Busse and John Winterhalder.

Just a gap away from greatness

Last season, freshmen Erin Myers and Jennifer Vavrek, sophomore Carol Petusky, and senior Carrie Ryan made it to state championships. But this year, Ryan is gone and a question is posed to Head Coach Dan Johnson, Who will be the person to fill the gap left by Ryan on the swimmers four lady relay team?

Johnson is not at a loss for fine swimmers. This year's swimmers contain freshman Corrie Gilgallon, sophomores Alicea Garceau and Malia Leck, junior Jeannie Janaes, and senior Kelly Howard. Who gets the call as Ryan's replacement? The freshmen Gilgallon.

"Carrie Ryan was a scholarship swimmer," Johnson said. "It will be hard to replace her. Corrie's (Gilgallon) times are right now as a freshman are about the

same as Carrie's (Ryan) her senior year. She's (Gilgallon) an excellent swimmer."

Gilgallon is not a familiar name but will be undertaking a similar task. Like her relay teammates (Myers, Petusky, Vavrek) Gilgallon will be promoted to varsity her freshman year. Gilgallon had been swimming in the Sharks program at the high school until two years ago. She then went on to a different program where she continued to excel and be an outstanding swimmer at the junior level. Now she must prove herself all over again at the high school level.

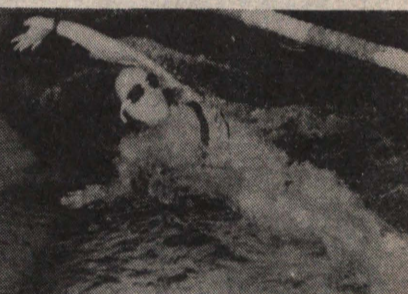
But even if Gilgallon is not as successful as Johnson hopes, he still has many swimmers to back her up. "We're a much deeper team than last year," Johnson said. "Natalie Baker has just joined the team and is a strong swimmer, and Sarah Bant has had a great summer." Johnson also men-

tioned that Debbie Dvorak, Amy Garceau, and Regina Viscogliosi were doing well and that there might be some surprises. "We practice nine times a week," Johnson went on. "I hope we have some surprises."

Myers, Petusky, and Vavrek have not exactly watched this go by. All three competed in the sharks summer program as well as competing in the highly touted Prairie State Games. Myers took a gold medal in the 100 meter breast stroke and the 200 meter breast, third in the 100 meter free, and was named the Pioneer Regions MVP. Petusky took second place in the 200 back and third in the 100 back and 100 fly. Petusky and Myers were also on a second place 400 free relay team. Vavrek took second in the 200 free and 1500 free and third in the 400 free. Vavrek was also on a 800 free relay team that took third.

The summer sharks team as a whole took 13th in state while Myers and Petusky had been voted onto TEAM ILLINOIS, the state all-star team. While in competition, Petusky captured a gold and silver medal in the 200 and 100 meter backstrokes.

Even though the diving team only has two divers, juniors Teresa Johnson and Julie Loek, they have hired a new diving coach Linda Alexander. Alexander holds the diving records at Augustana University and Coach Johnson said that evident progress is being made each day. Diver

Johnson seems to be comfortable with the switch as well, "Our coach (Alexander) has been diving for a long time and she knows what she's talking about."

Something that Johnson said would also be a test would be the new upgraded schedule containing powerhouse schools such as Downers Grove and Aurora Rosemary. Johnson claims that even if they don't win all their meets, it will make swimmers like Petusky, Gilgallon, Myers, and Vavrek have a bigger challenge. Johnson said that was the most important thing.

All these things wrapped together could mean a trip down state, and they could not. So far the ladies' swim team have won their first two meets with the relay team taking first. Their next challenge is in the Wego Invitational here starting at 9 a.m.

Taking a run at state

Last year the Cross Country team had the best season in the history of WCCHS by winning five invitationals, having a 10-1 record in dual meets and also placing second at regional competition and qualifying for sectionals

This year they hope to do even better with putting less stress on dual meets and will try to retain their invitational places. They also hope to place in the top four at the DVC races and qualify for state.

Returning varsity letter winners are senior John Jakubowski, All-State junior runner Rick Montalvo, and seniors James Stuart and James Zimmer. Joining them on the varsity team this year are sophomore Mike Callarman, and juniors Jason Fagan and Dave Zeisler. For the first time in two years, there will also be a girls cross country team that consists of varsity track MVP junior Nicole Horyn, freshmen Amy Kositas, Kelly McGloon, senior Stephanie Payton, and freshman Ann Zimmer. But head coach Bob Thompson warns against instant success. "I feel very positive," Thompson said. "However we are in a building process."

Some team members have been practicing and racing throughout the summer. The boys have participated in the park district running program while the girls ran with the Sundowners program. While in the programs, practice runs went up to six miles a day. The runners also competed in public races. Some of the highlights were Montalvo placing sixth at Railroad Days 10K run and third in the St. Charles Triple 8K. While in the 5K run at railroad days Nicole Horyn placed fourth and James Zimmer placed first. Head Coach Bob Thompson said that this year's team and last year's are equally as good.

Thompson is confident Montalvo will not go to state alone, but will be joined by his teammates, accomplishing the team goal to go to state. Montalvo said that he plans to be in the top 20.

Right now, the cross country team is undefeated, placing first and in the two invitationals with an overall record of 36-0.

The next home race will be against Glenbard East September 19 at 4:30 p.m. at Reed Keppler Park.
