


Why should I go down there I didn't do nothin, I'm a good girl. Man have you ever seen so many people?



Improved Cats Have Good Year — Take Third Place

The West Chicago Wildcats had an outstanding season which was both impressive on the field and on paper. A total of twenty-nine records were made by the team and individual members. Two of the many records set by Scott Dierking were most yards gained (133 yards) and most points made (156) in one season. Joe Hitzemann set records in most passing yards (491) per season and most passes completed (46). Randy Gibson also set a record for the most two point PAT with 8.

On defense, leading tacklers were Rick Lukens, Captain Amaury Toledo, and Captain Bill Fawell.

West Chicago also had four all conference players: Mark Beutke, Scott Dierking, Ken Fry, and Rick Lukens. Amaury Toledo who received honorable mention also received the "Most Valuable" award from the team.

The year ended with a 6-2 record. We-Go was only defeated by Sycamore and Geneva.

The whole team did an excellent job in helping the Cats to an exciting season. Next year the Cats will again follow their motto and be strong, be strong...




The Freshman team won first place in their division and had an overall record of six wins, two losses and one tie. They were defeated by Wheaton North and Wheaton Central.

With a win-loss record of 2-12, it's obvious Varsity cross country was not in its prime this year. Coach Netzel attributed their downfall to "key injuries - twisted ankles and the flu bug. Also three of the top ten runners didn't come out at the beginning of the season, and later two of the top four quit. Those remaining, including lead runners Joe Strock and Mike Hanes, ran very well but there were so few of them it didn't work out."

The Frosh-Soph team ran a little better with a 5-6 win-loss record and one tie. Leading runners were Dean Frederickson, Ed Skudlarek and Tom Gravenites.

What makes someone run seven to fifteen miles a day when he could be doing something else?

Ozzie Evans, the most improved runner on the Frosh-Soph team said he went out for cross country because he wanted to do something he could excel in to help the school. What Tom Gravenites gained from cross country was "getting in shape and earning a letter." This change was made for two reasons. Mrs. McGawn explained, "We feel that the foreign languages all have something in common. Each group is trying to learn about a foreign culture and they should have some idea of what happens in the other clubs. Also the clubs individually did not have enough strength and show of interest. Together they are getting more experience with languages." Within the large club each language still has its own club, officers and treasury. 


Experiencing the Reality of Work

I.R.O. and C.W.T. are job programs which enable students to escape the confines of the school classroom for a few hours each day to experience a different kind of learning situation in the reality outside — in the industries and businesses of West Chicago and surrounding towns.

C.W.T. (Cooperative Work Training) is a segment of the Basic Skills program at the school. Students in the Basic Skills program in their freshman and sophomore years generally get into C.W.T. in their junior and senior years. The program includes a work-related class, worth one credit, and also a paying job worth one credit toward graduation.

The I.R.O. (Interrelated Occupations) program is based upon the special career-oriented interests of the student. In most cases the I.R.O. student picks a job which relates in some way to his or her particular career choice. The I.R.O. class meets one period every morning where activities range from discussing job problems to learning income tax procedure. As in C.W.T., the I.R.O. student is graded, gets a total of two credits from the program and is paid the going rate for his work.



The student to student help that the math tutor provides is one solution to the "math-is-impossible" syndrome that plagues many of the freshmen taking general math.

Tutors often sit in on the lecture the teacher gives to the whole general math section during the first half of the period (5A) so they know what is going on. The tutor actually goes to work during the second half of the period (5C) when he is in his classroom answering questions about the lecture material or the assigned homework.

Each tutor is in charge of fifteen students and is under the supervision of one of the three general math teachers. The tutor also takes attendance and keeps his students' homework and test records.

How does Arlene Budreski feel about being a math tutor?: "I'm just doing it to help these kids. Kids can relate easier to me because I'm closer to their age... They hate me, but they respect me."

The P.E. leader puts himself or herself in a unique situation in that he is neither equal to the teacher nor on quite the same level as the students he is leading.

Along with such duties as leading exercises, demonstrating skills, helping students acquire skills, refereeing games, spotting stunts, and assisting teachers with hauling equipment,



there is another more intuitive leader duty: "To teach respect for discipline, but not act as disciplinarian."

When sophomores, the potential P.E. leaders apply to be in the leader program. In their junior year, those accepted in the program go into a training class; the girls' class is called the Junior Cadet class. In the training class the leaders learn how to teach skills,



how to referee correctly, and other basic fundamentals of being a leader.

The 46 leaders (18 girls and 28 boys) don't have to be the most physically adept people to be successful leaders. Rather they must be able and willing to help the students in a manner which both commands respect and, at the same time, encourages the student to want to improve himself.


AIDES

The aides probably don't realize just how appreciated their work is. All of the supervisors expressed their feelings with no hesitation. In commenting on their own specific aides, the replies actually reflected the general feelings about all of the student aides:

Oh! They're indispensible. Mrs. Root (Cook)

This place wouldn't run without them. Mr. Chambers (A.V. Supervisor)

Put it this way, it would be one heck of a burden if we didn't have them. Mr.



All this brings into question the whole purpose and usefulness of aides. Just what is it that aides do? What do they get out of it? Why do they do it?

In some cases the aide work is related to special interests or future careers. Nurse's aides usually have an interest in nursing. They learn basic first aid which they can apply during the nurse's absence in emergency situations. The paper work, such as health records and files, shows the aides another aspect of





nursing.

The work for the office and guidance department is good secretarial practice. Office aides run errands, file records, stuff envelopes, and run the mimeograph machine. Guidance aides answer the phone, file guidance records, show new students around and take care of the college schedule board and guidance bulletin board.

Some audio-visual aides do secretarial-type work too, such as typing, ordering films and materials, and answering

the phone. Other A.V. work is operating, delivering, and fixing equipment. People interested in electronics get experience from the repair work.

The cooks never have any trouble getting students to work in the cafeteria. The functioning of the cafeteria is very much dependent on the student work, which is either working the cash registers or serving food. The cafeteria aides receive a free lunch which is really earned because the jobs are done with the cooperation necessary to

make the "help" truly helpful.

There were relatively few hall monitors, library aides and science aides this year. It takes regular attendance at the jobs for them to be effective and the students who did work at them were useful. Science aides do things which range from aiding biology classes with disections to mixing solutions for chemistry classes. Library aides mainly check out and shelve books. Hall monitors check hall passes, direct school visitors, make sure lockers are closed,


and pick up papers in the hall.

The jobs aides do are basic. Regular aide work is needed for effective functioning of many departments of the school. Students who are working as aides give up some of their time everyday serving the school in a positive and constructive way.






The Bridge Is Built

After existing two years without a school newspaper, Wego has finally emerged with a new paper, The Bridge. The core of the staff established the successful paper by working on it after school, sometimes working until midnight putting the paper to bed. The newspaper staff worked with a handicap of not really functioning as a school newspaper but rather as a club, which meant they had no period in the school day to work on the paper.

The Bridge started out with about 15 staff members, but with each new issue there came a staff decrease. Inactive staff members dropped out until only the working core of the staff remained to continue producing a paper. The student body was made aware of the well-received paper's strained condition when Co-editor Mike Jolls sent out an open letter in February informing students that the paper couldn't continue in it's present capacity and more people were needed to work on the staff. With a reorganizational meeting and new additions to the staff, the paper got back to the presses and out to the students for the remainder of the year with realistic hopes for a Bridge in 1973.

Interview with Bridge Co-editor Mike Jolls by Challenge staff member

Q. What are you trying to accomplish with the paper?

Well, the title suggests that; the title is The Bridge. It's to form, let's say, an invisible bridge between teachers and students. That is, the teachers can see the students' views and the students can see the teachers' views. That's basically it, and also because the school needs a newspaper.

What is this gap between students and teachers that you're talking about? And how is the newspaper bridging it?

A I'd say kind of like an untrust. Teachers really don't trust students all of the way and vice versa. If you have two parties against each other, no way are you going to ever get anything accomplished. There has to be some sort of a collaboration in order to have a fair or good education system. The paper's a start; it's not all of the way, but it's part of it.

. Is there censorship of the paper by the school?

Yeah, we have some restrictions as such. One is that • we're not allowed to put public ads in the newspapers. The theory behind this is that the newspaper would become too commercial and the school would become too commercialized. Another is that we're at such point with vocabulary that we can't say 'such and such is' some vulgar term, or something like that because, first of all, that's poor writing in a newspaper and some of the kids may like it but the majority of the kids, I think, are turned off by that sort of a thing. That's true underground and we don't want that. We want to support the school as much as possible really. ... The advisor, Mr. Haas, has the last say. When the articles are all done, he reads them and says either, "yes or no, change this, or get this word out of here." We usually come to an easy agreement with most things, the two editors - Diana Walker and myself - and Mr. Haas.

Q. What was the biggest aid in getting the paper going?

A Well, the biggest aid would be Mr. Haas because last year (1970-1971) he wanted to organize a newspaper and he started to. Kids were signing up and everything. When this year (71-72) came around, the school, due to lack of financing, said No Dice, can't have a newspaper. This was sad and he was kind of disheartened about it. But he didn't give up; he formed a Journalism Club — he kind of went around the whole thing — and out of the Journalism Club we're running a newspaper . . . He's set it up; he's shown Diana Walker and me how to do stuff. We're greenhorns; we didn't know what to do. He's been helping us tremendously for every edition.

Q Is the paper mainly anti-school or pro-school in its philosophies?

A That all depends. It's neither, really. It's kind of a liberal paper. We're not always going to support the school. We're going to look at both sides, make a decision, and then write our articles about it or our commentaries or editorials on how we think ti should be.

Q. How does the staff support the paper?

A Easy — Since the school can't, we have to. That's why we have to charge (5 cents a copy) for it. Those are the breaks.

Q. What are you going to do with profits?

A. Have a party at the end of the year!



The golf team had problems beyond their control at the start of this year's season. The problems? — snow, cold, rain, soggy courses, and all-round bad weather.









From Practice . . . to Baccalaureate — Honors . . .

Diana has followed a college-prep



She thinks some students should have some say about the courses offered at the school. She also feels students should know in advance what teachers will be teaching specific courses. "Students and teachers are human and a personality clash can inhibit a student's learning."

Diana's love for acting surfaced immediately as she related her feelings about it, "I love the theater ... the idea of getting totally into a part, to get myself completely in the situation involved." She gets so totally involved in the characters she plays that she usually sees the other actors not just as high school actors but as the characters they play. Diana was pleased with the improvement in the drama department in the past two years and is glad that more people are getting interested in it. "I think people would be surprised how much they would like it (acting). Even working backstage is fun." Diana plans to major in drama at Southern Illinois University.

Asked if there was some world figure that she admired, Diana said, "One guy I really respected a lot was Gandhi, with his peaceful revolution tactics. Now so many revolutionaries say they are against war or are pacifists, but end up with violence or bombing buildings, which is really inconsistent. Gandhi was always peaceful in getting his point across."

Diana's attitude about participation in different school activities sums up a positive brand of involvement, "Most of the time if I'd really want to do something, I'd do it."
