










They Did It Themselves!


Brian Jarmy summed up the Sophomore experience as "bazarr and excellent."

Competition Arises ... And Who Will Win?

Teachers, like students, were very competitive. The most talked-about and "heated" competition was a bicycle riding contest between Steve Arnold and George Strecker: the winner would ride to school on the greater number of days.

With 250 students entering their classrooms and monitoring the contest's progress, it was no wonder that rumors filled the air and contrasting stories circulated. 












Our high school years were a time to enjoy ourselves and be a bit crazy, but we also had to take time to realize the importance of academics. With 1,359 students and a staff of 130, Wildcats worked on required and elective courses. The ratio of students to professional staff was thirteen to one.

District 94 set a graduation requirement of twenty credits for the class of '89. The years that follow must increase this by one-half credit. Class requirements were also needed such as: English, 3 credits; social studies, 2 1/2 credits; math, 2 credits; science, 1 credit; physical education, 4 credits; any combination of art, music, foreign language or vocational education, 1 credit; and electives, 6 credits.

An alternative to an elective class, providing 2 1/2 credits per year, was

DAVEA, a DuPage County cooperative providing thirty specialized vocational and technical programs from which high school juniors and seniors could choose.

Wildcat seniors who met all requirements were able to graduate. About forty-two percent planned to go to college and took college preparatory courses. Twenty-two percent took general education courses, and thirty-five percent pursued vocational education.

Juniors and seniors who took ACT tests had these average scores: English 19.3; math, 20.9; social studies, 20.1; natural sciences, 23.4; and composite 21.1.



Are Required Courses That Important?

Yes! Required courses really are that important. To get into a four year college, you must take four years of English, three years of math, two and a half years of social studies, two years of science and two years of foreign language or fine arts. Students can meet these requirements because of our seven hour day. In order for seniors to graduate they need twenty credits this year and twenty and one half thereafter.

The Illinois Board of Education

and local districts determine these requirements. And due to the new requirements, electives are being changed: next year home maintenance will replace industrial arts. College bound students appreciate the school requirements because they realize that they are necessary for college; other students agree with them because they know that the courses will help to prepare them for their future lives.

Work Pays Off

PAYDAY! The sweet sound of payday rings through our ears, but for others it may mean no pay but "great work experience." Programs like Inter-Related Occupations, Cooperative Work Training and DAVEA help students begin their careers right after high school graduation. Students learn entry level skills in the work field.

IRO and CWT provide experiences for students to work as bankers, accountants, child care 'orkers, auto-mechanics, legal secretaries and dental assistants. Students attend school for half a day and work the other half. These work programs consist of juniors and seniors who may take no more than five credits per year. They need to submit two references and a drivers license because transportation is not provided. Depending on their skills

students are put into either IRO and CWT. CWT serves the basic skills program. IRO serves college bound students of whom about half go on to college. As for improvements Mrs. Streicher stated, "IRO is planning to add more entrepreneurship and economics. I am also happy to see the quality of the students and the jobs come a long way."

DAVEA is a vocational school where students receive two and a half credits for the year. Students prepare themselves for entry level positions in fields like cosmotology, photography, auto-mechanics and computer programming. They attend a learning lab where they go through their goals and work independently. Their records are then sent to their employer.

Just Do It ... Study!

Since the Learning Resource Center was a place to study, noise-makers received various warnings from LRC Aide Charlotte Barsema. During the last few weeks of school her frequent remark was, "I don't want to see you till September!" Studying was made easier in the LRC by the addition of Newsbank, an indexed microfiche system with articles from re-

gional newspapers. An expanded inter-library loan program, which provided books from the DuPage Library System, allowed students to use many more materials for research than were owned by the school. The LRC also had computers, tape recorders, VCR's, tapes, markers,

magazines, newspapers, stencils and calculators as well as books.

During unscheduled hours students like Kelly Lee studied in the LRC: "I do my homework so that I don't have to bring it home, and I converse." John Prusko said, "I like to use one of the computers. My favorite game is 'Where in the World is Carmen San Diego?"

Some of the students in the LRC like Sally Hohbein were

waiting for their turn behind the wheel of Drivers' Education. While waiting, Hohbein commented, "I liked Drivers' Ed. I just didn't like it when they all said, 'Don't kill anybody.' Cute, eh?" Jody Schwab, waiting with Hohbein said, "I almost didn't get my license, so I felt great when I got it. It was funny when everyone said, 'Oh no - you drive now! I don't wanna get in the car!" Most driving students usually found their way to the LRC because, as Kim Haves said. "Mom and Dad always say I have to have my grades up in order to keep my car."

Bilingual students, all 261 of them, studied most classes in Spanish the first year. During the second and third years, they gradually had more and more classes in English. In addition to their usual teachers, they had new teacher Linda Fuller to help them. And as Principal Dr. Alan Jones explained, "The bilingual emphasis now is on cooperative learning and peer tutors."

All in all, the LRC was a great place to study or relax during unscheduled time: it all depended on what kind of mood everyone was in and how much studying was necessary.







Orlando, Florida.

























After a long hard campaign across the nation, Republican Vice-President George Bush defeated Massachusetts Democratic Governor Michael Dukakis in the Presidential election. In Chicago Richard Daley won the mayoral election.

In West Chicago's mayoral election, Paul Netzel beat the former twelve-year mayor, Eugene Rennels. At the high school, student council candidates campaigned for the first time, setting up tables with promotional balloons, posters and gifts during 4th hour lunches in the cafeteria.

The biggest political scandal was the Iran Contra Affair. Lieutenant Oliver North, facing a maximum of ten years in prison and a fine of \$750,000, was found guilty of 3 of 12 criminal counts.

In Iran there may be a shift from spiritual guides to politicians. Ayatollah Khomeini died on June 3rd, and succeeding him was spiritual leader Ali Khamenei who was expected to turn to the West for trade and other ties to save Iran from economic collapse.
