## A New Success For NHS

National Honor Society developed into an entirely different program. No longer is it only a senior recognition night, but now it also recognizes juniors. Principal Alan Jones explained that the addition of juniors was mainly due to pressure from parents, but now responsibilities come along with the selection. Juniors have the opportunity to come back their senior year and make a difference at the school. Dr. Jones wants them to prove their worthiness by setting up community projects and lead tutoring programs before, during, and after school. He's optimistic that they can use their talents and academic strengths to help other students.
The selection process, as with every year, was a long and difficult one. All of the upperclassmen with a 3.0 G.P.A. or above were invited to an assembly in the auditorium. The four criteria of scholarship, service, leadership, and character needed to make it into NHS were presented. The name of each person was sent to all of the teachers in the school, and if they knew them they were to write acceptable or unacceptable for the four requirements. Every student was given a form of their list of activities to fill out and these sheets were sent to a committee of six people after the names had been removed. These five faculty members and one sponsor ultimately set the standard and decided by consensus who was eligible. All of the inductees then received a letter from Dr. Jones inviting them to a ceremony on April 6.

After a welcome by Dr. Jones, English teacher Ann MacDonald took the mike. At first she discussed what it meant to be 'honorable' and then went on to challenge every person in the audience to write down a goal to accomplish during the next year. She promised to use all of her powers to make someone's personal dream become a reality if ninety-five percent shared with her next year the good news that they did what they set out to do. John Rakow recalled that "She gave an excellent speech. It really made me think about what my goals should be." Dr. Jones and Assistant Principal Carol Sweeder then came forward to help give the pin and certificate to the new members. After the ceremony a reception was held in the Commons.

The students enjoyed the evening and it will remember it as something to be proud of.

WeGo said goodbye to three great faculty members this year, but they'll leave some wonderful memories behind. Ron "Butch" Hansen, David Ream and Ron Benner will never forget their teaching years here. Each has been here for at least thirty years and has noticed a lot of growth and diversity inside the school.

Athletic Director Ron Hansen always had close roots to West Chicago. After graduating from WeGo in 1955 and attending NIU, he returned home and taught two years at the junior high, but came back to his alma mater in '62. Math and coaching were on the agenda until he was appointed Athletic Director in 1973. This job was very appropriate for him considering the fact he'd played and coached football, basketball. track, and baseball. Throughout the years he saw the growth of boys sports and the addition of girls. He had many responsibilities such as the scheduling of games and busses, hiring of officials, and use of facilities for practice. Hansen has a lot more extra time on his hands and now plans to enjoy it. Now that his kids are gone he's free to travel and he described retirement by suggesting, "a ton of things could happen."

David Ream was a history teacher and coach for thirty-six years at WeGo. Besides the fact that both of his parents were teachers, Ream also enjoyed working with young people, so teaching was an obvious career. Recalling that WeGo changed tremendously in his years and diversified enormously, Ream remembered when the school only had 600 students in 1960. He also said he will always remember the time that he got stuck in the mud and lost his shoe during a football game at Batavia High School. Students will always remember Ream for his favorite quote, "It's not worth a bucket of spit." However, slowing down is not his future plan. He owns part of a farm near Galena, IL, where he'll keep busy along with working at his fire wood business.
