## \$29 Million Referendum To Bring Huge Changes To West Chicago H.S.

Alumni may not know this place when next they return to visit their high school home. The passage of a building and renovation referendum in Novembasof'9zset in motiosiplanstorecendition and expand Communifyltigh School. Set teCBeghit after school closed in 1998, the project would completely replace the heating, cooling, and electrical systems of the existing building, add 25 new classroomb, replace lockes roons, and wire the school for the technology of the twenty-first cenfury. ?
The project wouldrequire a complete redesign of the school's campus, moving athletic facilities to the practice fields west of Wood Street and, eventually, to new homes at the cleaned up Kerr-McGee site on nearby Factory Street. The school's impressiveand historic eastfacade would be preserved,'but speculation was that the new west entrances to the schoot wopld become the school's new "front doors." With the excitenfieffeoffex possibilities came the realization of teachers and students that for 2 to 3 years they would be working and studying in a construction site.
 Bighem, The oldiwest parking lofeíand the schoef garages will disappear with the new construction. Teachers will no longer have to worry about taking a mirror off the school vans or scraping their quatter panels while trying to put them in their stalls, but, because of the tack of space on the 25 acre school site, there may be no on-site storage for grounds equipment.

## Government Classes Propose And Pass Laws

The tenth session of the West Chicago High School Representative Assembly met this fall. This biannual event has become the centerpiece of the American Government curriculum since it began in the Spring of 1993. According to government teacher Steve Arnold, the purpose of the simulation is to engage students in decision making processes practiced in a democratic society and to help students learn how they can participate in the legislative process. Students worked in teams to define and research issues they thought were important. They then proposed bills for consideration by their peers. The bills were reviewed by committees, and those which committees approved were then debated and voted upon during the full legislative session.
The simulation led to students learning about more than just how the government works, though. Richie DiVito said, "I've
learned that people who are shy and quiet and you wouldn't expect to speak up have strong opinions." During the debate on amendments to bills Joe Kaczmarek noted, "Now I know why nothing gets done in the real government." Gabe Bautista said, "It is hard to understand the issues, and you have to do a lot of research, but in return you learn a lot about the government."

The bills discussed during the simulation reflected the issues being discussed throughout the nation as the simulation took place, and many bills were directly connected to students' lives. For instance, one team proposed a law which would have ended consideration of ACT or SAT scores in the college admissions process. Students who would participate in the Spring session followed events closely as they anticipated their own chance to engage in the debate.
