Students involved in Business Technical Internship (BTI), Cooperative Work Training (CWT), and the Technology Center of DuPage ("TCD," previously known as DAVEA) are among those who have an idea of "what they want to be when they grow up. "These classes provide students with a realistic view of the occupations in which they are interested.

BTI and CWT build a bridge between school and a career. In class, students learn how to obtain job success and receive consumer education. The opportunities are endless though, depending on the student's background experience in the job they want to pursue. Jobs are available to students as pharmacy techs, bank tellers, dental or medical assistants, auto mechanics, child care assistants, and office assistants, just to name a few. Local businesses also offer paid internships that give students a head start in deciding which direction or type of job they prefer.

This year the 31st annual Employer-Employee Luncheon was held on May 19, 1999 at the Courtyard in Warrenville. Plaques were handed out to employers in appreciation of providing good work experiences, and in remembrance of their West Chicago Student employees. The students and their employers enjoyed this opportunity to relax and socialize outside the formal environment of the work day and competed for door prizes.

TCD, which is similar to a trade school, prepares students to go into great entry level positions in automotive technology, cosmetology, health services, computer technology, and a variety of other careers in high demand. Bryan Shelly said that TCD is fun and provides him with good hands-on learning. "I like the teachers because they interact with the students on a different level, " commented Shelly. Students that attend TCD usually spent half the day at West Chicago and the other half getting the skills they need for future job success.

One of the many special teachers at We-Go is Karan Oliver-Tucci. Oliver-Tucci teaches science, but can also teach psychology. This was her third year here at WCCHS and said she "loves it very much." She started teaching right out of college. Oliver-Tucci originally wanted to be involved in veterinary medicine because she enjoyed biology so much. She said, "I love working with teenagers because they are eager to learn, fun to be around, have different personalities, and the school is a unique environment to be in." She did some subbing and said, "I actually really liked it. It was fun." Oliver-Tucci said she participates in We-Go spirit by dressing up for spirit days and going to pep assemblies and such. She thinks her students are great and all her classes are equally good. The students seem to be the same over the years, but she has changed her teaching approach and how she deals with the students. When she first started teaching she was a little nervous, but she adjusted to it and doesn't really find any problems in her classes. "Most of my students respond well to my teaching techniques. If a student excels in her class, Oliver-Tucci will ask him or her if they want to do a research expedition. This gives the students a chance to work in different areas of science. They also gain work experience with science professionals in different parts of the country and sometimes even the world. The experience usually depends on the type of research the student will be doing and the place that is sponsoring the person to go. If a student is interested, Oliver-Tucci will set a student up with an application and try to help him or her find a sponsor. Several students have been interested in pursuing this. OliverTucci herself has done an Earthwatch research expedition. She went to Argentina to study Black-Howlen monkeys. Her grant came from Earthwatch and allowed her to stay down there for part of the summer. Oliver-Tucci said one of the reasons she did it was to see what it would have been like if she had followed through with veterinary medicine. Down there doing her research, Oliver-Tucci "realized how much I love teaching and I was thankful that I went through with it." She thought the trip was neat "being out in the field and studying wild animals in their natural habitat was an amazing experience!"
Another special teacher is Kevin Gimre. He is involved in school activities and paches baseball and basketball teams. Gimre has been here at WCCHS for 9 pars now and enjoys being here because "every day is different." He enjoys workig with the other teachers and loves teaching teenagers. Gimre likes to make lem smile and laugh. Helping them learn in a fun way is something Gimre strives 1r. He did not always want to be a teacher. When he was in high school he wantIto be a businessman, but while taking finance and accounting classes he found edidn't like them, so he switched to teaching.
