Will It Ever End?

When students begin to kill other students, we must ask ourselves a simple question: "Why would anyone do something like this? What did these kids do in their lives to deserve such a fate?" Although many people think that they know the answer to these questions, we may never really know because we can't get into the mind of another person. The impression was that the students involved in violence were made to feel like outcasts, and all of their anger was put into extreme violence. After the many school shootings that occurred over a span of two years, teens were starting to wake up and realize that maybe teasing other people and treating each other unequally weren't good things to do. There is this thing called the Golden Rule - treat others how
you would like to be treated and practice tolerance with others. As sophomoreSean Suwalskiput it, "You can't live your life in fear."

According to the Center for the Study and Prevention of Violence (CSPV), 235 school associated violent deaths occurred in the United States from 1992 to 1999. Between the years of 1989 and 1995, the percentage of students who felt unsafe in school was about $6 \%$. From 1995 to 1999, the percentage rose to about $12 \%$, and with the recent rise in school violence, that percentage was well on it's way to becoming a largernumber. According to the same study by the CSPV, at least 9 out of 10 schools have a system called the "Zero Tolerance Policy" where the school has a predetermined punishment for a specific offense. In an effort to address violence, many schools implemented zero tolerance policies by the 19992000 school year.

In the wake of all this, schools worked this year to become even safer for students, teachers, and all staff members. We may be able to create that perfect environment someday in the future, but for now all we can do is take one day at a time.
