# September 11, 2001

## A NEW DAY OF INFAMY



"And now here's a special announcement from Dr. Jones..."

On the morning of September 11, 2001, during third hour announcements, Senior Nicole Patel unknowingly turned over the microphone to principal Dr. Jones. He proceeded to inform students of the events that shook the nation earlier that morning.

"Two planes have crashed into the World Trade Center in New York and one into the Pentagon. Our thoughts and prayers are with those in New York," said Jones.

The cunning, stealthy act by terrorists violated the security of America's borders. Hijacked Flights 11 and 175 crashed into World Trade Center Towers 1 and 2 at 7:48 am. and 8:05 am. respectively.

At 9:43 am., Flight 177 flew into the west wall of the Pentagon, collapsing one of the building's five sides.

Flight 93, bound for San Francisco, took a sharp turn south and headed for an unknown destination, but luckily, it

never made it. Passengers in the plane formed an alliance to take down the hijackers. Before acting, several passengers called family members and friends to say their last good-byes and to inform them of their plan. Passengers grouped together and took over the plane, but it cost them their lives. Through their deaths, numerous others, that would have died, survived. At 9:48 am. the plane crashed in rural Pennsylvania, with no survivors.

The World Trade Center Towers, built to withstand almost any imaginable scenario, collapsed due to the intense heat of the explosions. They fell on employees within in the towers, on rescue workers trying to help evacuate victims, and on the hopes of those praying for loved ones to escape. The inconceivable notion of passenger jets being substituted for bombs came true. In the course of a single day thousands died.

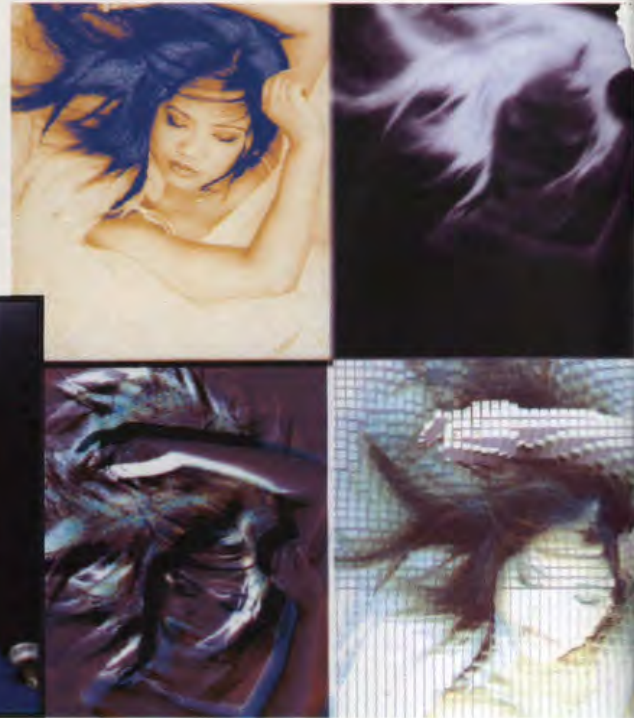

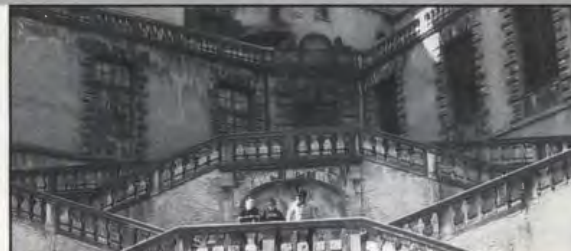

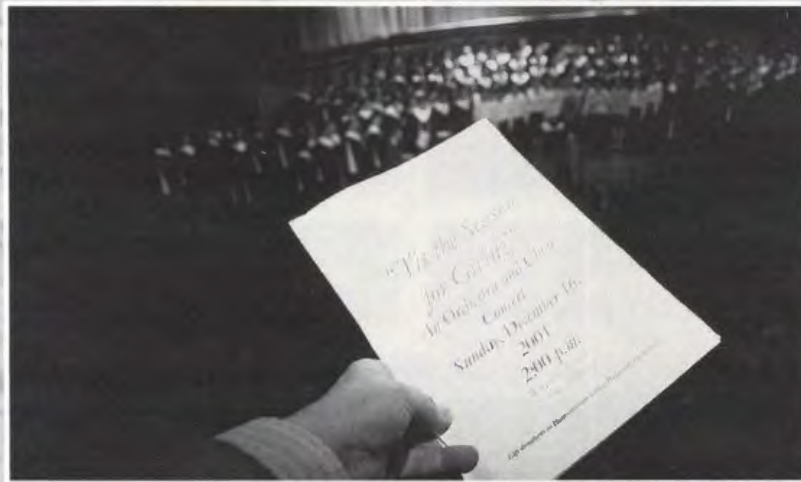

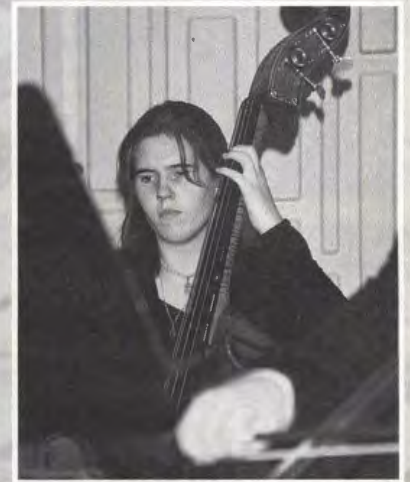

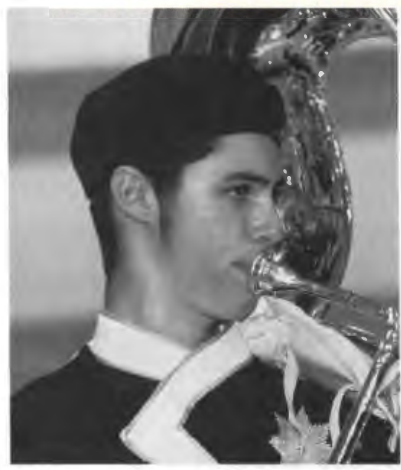

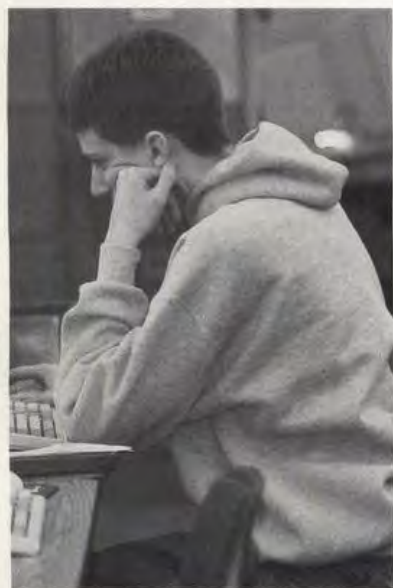
# Smart and Smarter

In an attempt to give students more access to computers and a quiet place to study, Community High School transformed the old study hall room into the Academic Skills Center (ASC). Here, students spent the school year writing essays, revising papers, getting help from teachers, and meeting for extracurricular activities. Both peer helpers and the math team used this room for their morning gatherings. Every day, the ASC opened up at 7:15 in the morning and closed at 4:30 in the afternoon, giving students numerous opportunities to excel academically.

## Students and faculty agree: It's a Scream!

The image of students reading a book by Stephen King or watching the original *Psycho* seems like something that would happen after school, doesn't it? Guess again. Both of these works were taught in the Gothic/Horror Literature seminar offered by the English Department.

Gothic Literature (offered every other year to Juniors and Seniors) has been taught by Mrs. Minor since its introduction to the curriculum in 1999. When asked her opinion of the seminar, Minor said, "When I first decided to pursue the idea of offering a seminar course, I tried to think, 'What kinds of literature do high school students like, but don't have the chance to learn about in the usual progression of English classes?' Horror came to mind right away, and after doing some of my own 'homework', I realized that Gothic had to be part of the course as well."

During the past school year, the number of students enrolled in the class increased from 63 in 1999 to 82 this year. And the popularity of the unusual course continued to spread. Rumors even surfaced that the class would be offered on an annual basis from now on. For the time being, however,

Minor said that she enjoys the class as it is. "The students seem taken back when I have them read a *Goosebumps* book the first week," she said, "and I chuckle watching a few startled students jump when we review the components of modern horror via *The Haunting*." According to Junior Pete Oelslager, who took the seminar first semester, the class was "awesome." While Oelslager felt some hesitation about the subject matter of the course, he said, "It was probably the best class I've taken this year."

While most students felt happy with the seminar, the opinion on the work load varied tremendously. Many students thought the assignments were relatively simple, yet an equal number of students said the amount of work turned out to be far more intense than they expected. Senior Jeff Raun said of the workload, "Pretty hard, small print, no pictures, more than 3 syllables in each word. It was hard work, but when I did it, it was interesting."

With the wide variety of pieces taught, everyone agrees this class shouldn't be missed.

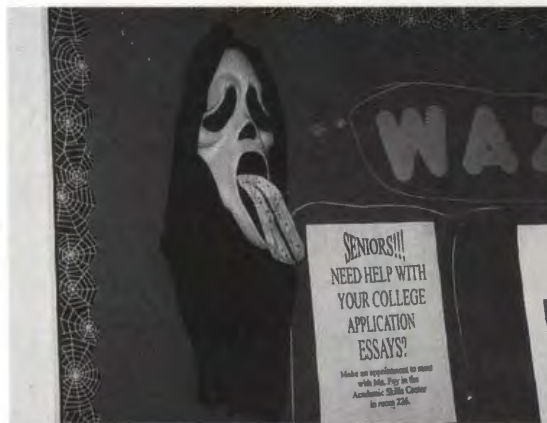


The class is composed of only juniors and seniors. "The seminars are set up for juniors and seniors because these students have room in their schedules to choose options in their curriculum," says Minor.

## Photography



More than 250 students learned how to look at the world around them differently by joining one of the three levels of photography: beginning, intermediate, or advanced. Throughout these courses offered by the industrial arts department, the students teamed up with 35mm cameras and learned the art of snapping photographs.

After the first four weeks of class, the students worked independently to get their work done. Assignments included creating a self-portrait, a photograph of a door, and an advertisement. The students were assigned to the dark room on specific days and expected to develop their own photographs. Their only homework was to take pictures.

The 2001/2002 school year was the first time the advanced photography class

was offered at Community High School. Only students who completed Photography One and Two and who had the consent of their teacher were eligible to take the class. The students in this class wrote their own curriculum, which needed to be approved by Miss Dulkinys, the advanced photography teacher. The students set their own deadlines and were expected to meet them. These students usually chose a specific area to focus on such as fine arts and portfolio production.

According to one of the photography teachers, Mrs. Rieger, the photography classes require dedicated and responsible students who can handle working by themselves.

# MECHANICAL & TECHNICAL DRAWING

## Draw!

Each year students want to learn how to express their artistic sides through drawing and drafting. In the Mechanical Drawing, Technical Drawing, and Architecture classes, Mr. Junkroski gives his students this opportunity and teaches them the basics of visualization, architecture, software, drawing, or anything else having to do with mechanical parts. In 2001/2002 academic year, students learned how to draw everyday machine parts. Some specific parts included: different kinds of gaskets, bearings, blocks, clamps, caps, anvils, wheels, and boxes.

Students of all grades attended these classes. "Any student who is interested in engineering, architectural building, interior design, drawing, or use of computers [can take this class]," said Junkroski. "[These students] can later pursue a degree around these areas in college."

These classes helped the students to visualize general objects around the home. Students who attended this class worked on projects in which they cut open a sectional object to see what it looks like inside and then sketched the object. After sketching it out, they drew the object neatly with rulers in sectional views. The last step was to put it in the Computer Aided-Drafting (CAD) program. Students turned in their drawings and received grades for their efforts.

Said Junkroski, "A drafting class allows a student to be creative and at the same time, learn new practical skills."

By taking these classes students received new knowledge about drawing that will help them with future careers.

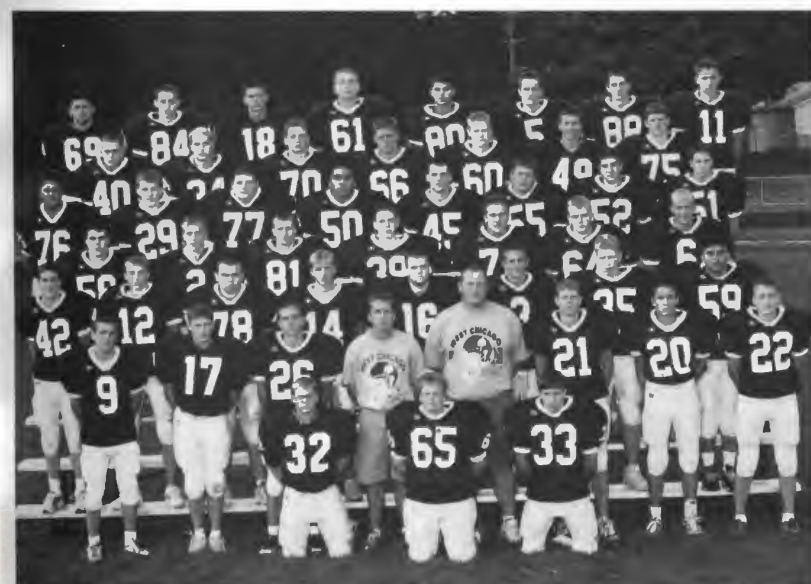

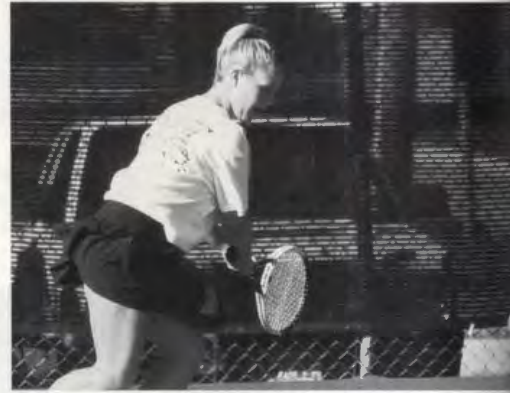

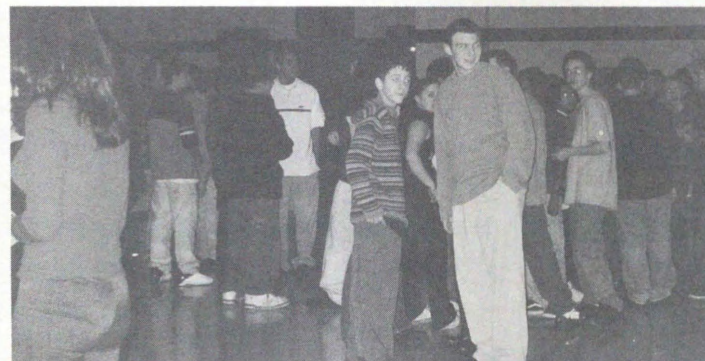

Since its beginning, the Bilingual Program has made a lot of progress and a huge difference in the high school experiences of people who come here from other countries. The program teaches students English and helps them to improve their grades. Students in this program move on and succeed in classes outside of the program. Teachers keep in touch with past students to motivate them and to make sure that they keep their grades up.

Students begin at the Welcome Center, a place where they learn the basic skills for high school. Prepared students then leave the Welcome Center and transfer out of Lincoln School and into the bilingual classrooms in another part of the school. These classes are taught like any other class, except that some are taught in Spanish, until they can move up to regular English classes.

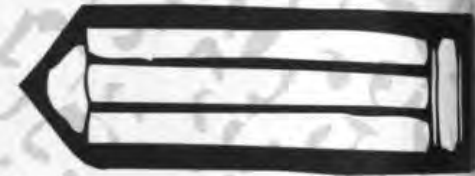

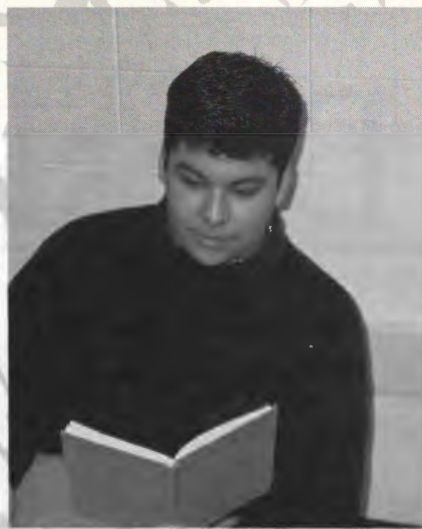

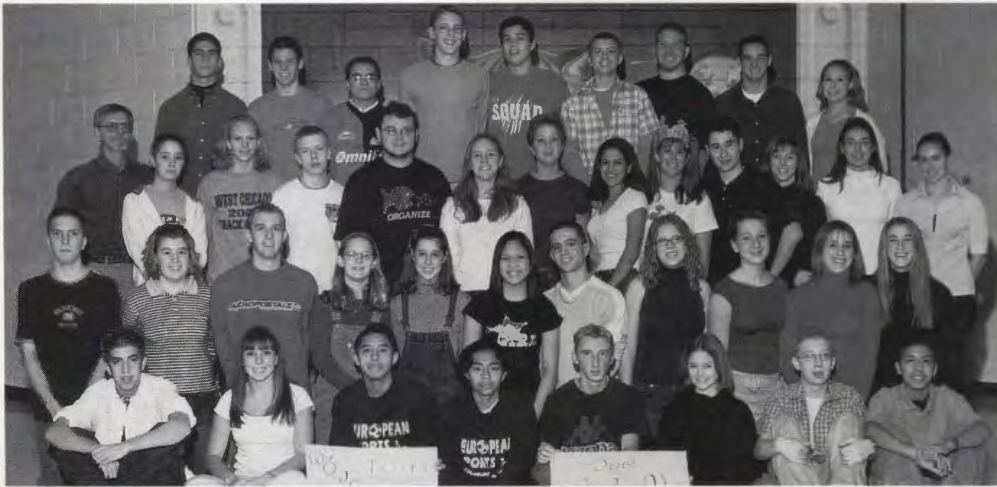
# Student Council

2001-2002 featured the 18th and 19th legislative sessions for the Government classes for the ninth year in a row. This simulation is conducted by students in the Government classes. The students simulate Congress by creating bills, having them passed through committees of other representatives, and debating these bills in the simulation. The majority of students in Government are seniors who need to pass this class in order to graduate. A handful of juniors also took the class.

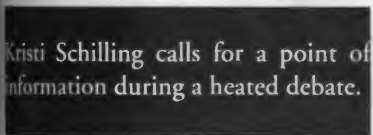

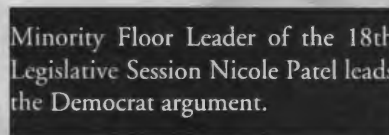

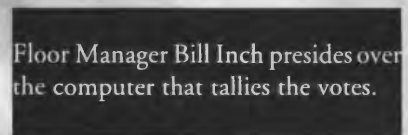

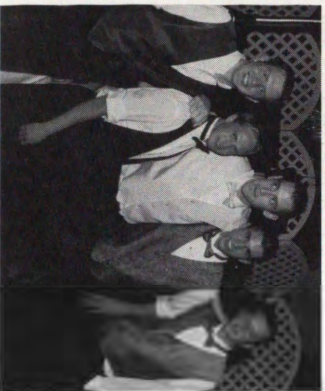

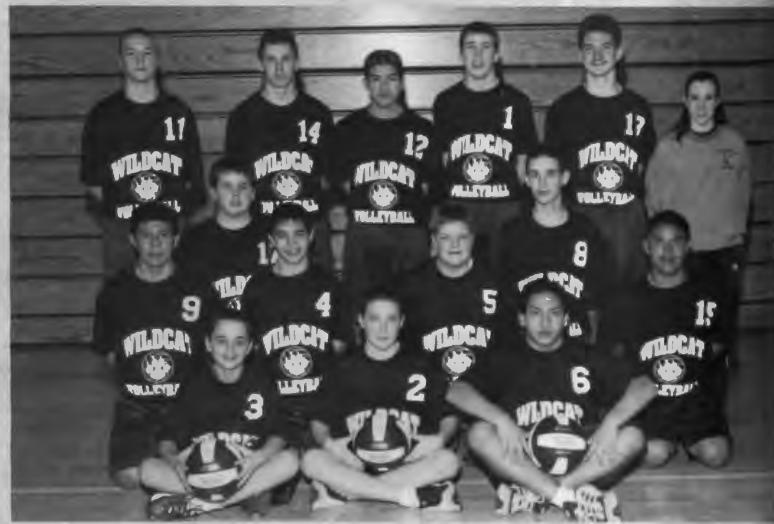

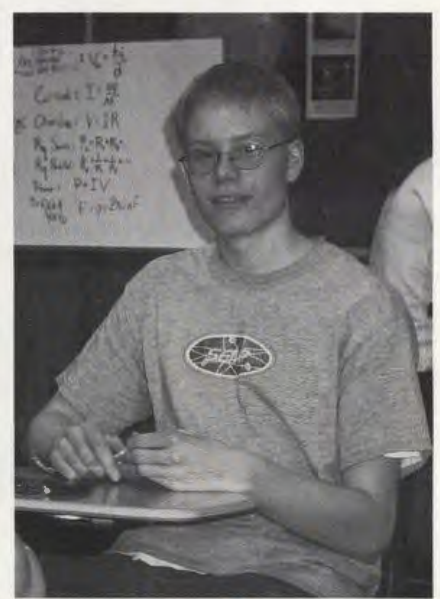
