








### WE-GO CELEBRATES A CENTURY OF CAT

Buildings often last foil over 100 years, but tow schools stand as strong as Community High School de today. The people filling the hallways and classrooms of We-Go make it the incredible place it is. Graduates scomfort within the walls of the place they recently inhabited as past athletes come to cheer on new generation of competitors.

While the entity of We-Go is 100 years old, high school level classes were offered as far back as 1870's. There was no four-year program then, and the classes were actually held in three different places be high schoolers settled in the building we occupy today. The first graduation occured in 1906, and only 12 studified into Methodist Church to recieve their diplomas. In 1924, the Football team won the first IHSA Class championship, defeating Mount Carmel 32-0, the first shutout in state championship history. Present Community High School was born in 1926. In 1928, We-Go had its first uniformed high school band. W 1941-1945 rolled around, World War II had its impact. Students left before graduation to serve their countries, the administration dedicated "Bishop Gym" in hands of Samuel D. Bishop. The U.S. Department Education recognized Community High School as a Blue Ribbon School in 1993. Seven years later, the E School Band marched in the London Millennium Parade as 1 of 14 banks from U.S. and the only one from Illing.

Over the years, each member of the school has cherished memories of We-Go. Alumni seem to reappet thankful that they have Community High School to visit. With diversity, drive and dreams, every member of Go realizes high school can be a pivotal time during one's life. 













### Students Report to the Dance Floor to Celebrate Homecoming















Our diverse school body consists of students from many







The efforts of Ms. Blume and Ms. Wirth, FBLA advisers, certainly paid off with another impressive display of talents and energy. Bravo.






#### Cheerleaders Give It All They've Got On Game Day




### Classy Cats Band Members March One By One








# Tennis Talent Creates a Commotion on the Court







# Contenders Wrestlers Take On The Competition












