We had one third of our students at a time on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday with Monday and Friday remaining as remote learning days. While many students chose to remain fully remote due to health and family concerns, it was great to have some life in the building and students were welcomed with some fanfare.

### Trasition Program Starts Their Own Business

In order to provide its students with real world work experience, the transition program started a custom t-shirt company this year. Students handle most aspects of the business, ranging from taking the order to setting up the t-shirt press to actually producing the final product. Students even produced their own commercial and had a viewing party to kick off their business. The staff who participated in the project have been nominated for the Illinois State Board of Education's 2022 Those Who Excel award. The business is funded through a grant provided by the Illinois Department of Rehabilitation Services.





















# VACCINATION

As different groups were eligible for vaccinations, administration put together vaccination clinics for the WEGO community, staff and students. At our very first clinic in February, approximately 2500 community members and from WCCHS as well as districts 25, 33 and 34 were vaccinated against COVID-19. This was followed by a clinic in for students 16 and over and another in May when the eligibility age dropped to 12 and older. Staff members and student ambassadors put in many hours to help the clinics run effectively. We even got press coverage in the Trib and on ABC 7 news.


































# MOCKEGISLATURE

As part of this exercise, our seniors discern where they are on the political spectrum, research and write bills, respectfully debate ideas, form caucuses and vote on their bills as a full class.















# SEASONS IN LIMBO






MANY SPORTS STOPPED MARCH 12 and by early July, it looked like there would be no college football when the ky League ruled out playing all fall sports. Other conferences soon followed suit. But then, more and more schools reversed course, beginning limited seasons and playing to empty or limitedcapacity stadiums. Seasons continued to be plagued by players testing positive, forcing games to be rescheduled or canceled. IN AN EFFORT TO RESUME the NBA season, the league invited the top 22 teams at the time of suspended play on March 11 to the ESPN Sports Complex at Walt Disney World in Orlando. The league created a protective bubble, severely limiting the players' exposure to anything or anyone outside the bubble. Teams arrived July 7 with play resuming July 30. Eight regular games determined which 16 teams progressed to post-season playoffs. In the end, the Los Angeles Lakers triumphed over the Miami Heat in the best of seven series, winning it all on Oct. 11. LeBron James won his fourth MVP, the only player to win MVP honors with three different teams.







ALTHOUGH THE FIRST U.S. CASE of COVID-19 was diagnosed in January, the country didn't begin shutting down until March when the World Health Organization declared the virus a pandemic. Sports halted, schools and all nonessential businesses closed as states began crafting plans for stay-at-home orders to curb the spread. ESPECIALLY SUSEPTIBLE TO CORONAVIRUS, the elderly and those with health issues stayed isolated for months. Friends and relatives were forced to visit them from outside their windows. COVID patients in hospitals died alone, unable to have contact with their loved ones. STATES SET UP TESTING CENTERS where people waited for hours as lines of cars stretched for miles. The respiratory disease spread through droplets in the air with symptoms including fever, cough and sore throat. After taking the nasal swab test, people sometimes waited for weeks for results and labs were overwhelmed.



## SUMMER HEATS UP


experts warned about crowds during summer holidays, but high temperatures drove people to beaches. After the Fourth of July, cases spiked and the U.S. death toll hit 50,000. Though the U.S. had only four percent of the world population, it had more than 20 percent of COVID cases, prompting Europe to ban travelers from the U.S. beginning in July. Some states imposed their own travel restrictions, requiring quarantines.







**MEDICAL PERSONNEL** became heroes, working long hours as their hospitals exceeded capacity. Large cities like New York resorted to temporary field hospitals to handle the overload. Though the numbers subsided in the summer, by the end of October, 230,000 had died in the U.S. At least 31 states set their one-day infection records in October, reporting a new case every 1.3 seconds during the last week of the month. THROUGHOUT MAY and early June, most states began a gradual, phased reopening after cases peaked in April. First came more essential services, then salons reopened. Restaurants reopened with limited capacity, and bars and gyms followed later. Most cities and states stressed social distancing, wearing masks and washing hands as preventatives, but local requirements varied widely.





#### RACE FOR A VACCINE

#### **DUBBED OPERATION WARP SPEED,**

the race for a vaccine involved nearly 30 companies. By late summer, several potential vaccines had entered preliminary trials, but three major companies stopped their trials in early October due to adverse reactions in volunteers. Within the month, all were back on track. Although President Trump had talked of having a vaccine by November, medical experts predicted it would be at least early 2021 before one passed all the FDA trials, and it would take months before it became widely available to the general population.







#### MOST SCHOOL YEARS

ended in March 2020, and controversy swirled about whether schools should reopen in the fall. Plans varied from state to state, ranging from inperson instruction to virtual learning to a blend of both. Teachers tailored methods to accommodate, presenting to empty classrooms in many cases. Students who attended in person wore masks in socially distanced classrooms and endured quarantines as classmates tested positive for the virus.



Two days after the World Health Organization declared COVID-19 a pandemic on March 11, 2020, President Trump declared the virus a National Emergency, unlocking billions in federal funding to fight the spread of the disease. The country came to a halt in an effort to stop the virus from spreading. Retail businesses, gyms, hair salons and restaurants closed. Schools sent students home, sports seasons were canceled and travel bans took effect. The race began to develop a vaccine that would fight the virus.

## **MAY & JUNE**

- May 21: Health and Human Services created "Operation Warp Speed" to accelerate the development, manufacture and distribution of vaccines to combat COVID-19.
- May 21: The U.S. and AstraZeneca formed a vaccine deal and predicted a vaccine could be ready by October.
- May 23: The U.S. death toll from COVID-19 reached 100,000.

#### »NEW-NORMAL TRADITIONS

- With schools closed across the country, seniors missed out on the tradition of graduation. Many schools held drive-thru or virtual graduations complete with caps and gowns.
- June 10: U.S. cases reached
   2,000,000 with cases up in 20 states.
- June 26: Texas and Florida halted reopening plans as cases rose.



## **AUGUST**

- Aug. 7: Talks stalled in the Senate after the HEALS (Health, Economic Stimulus, Liability Protection and Schools) Act, a second stimulus bill, was introduced in late July.
- Aug. 11: The Trump administration paid \$1.5 million for 100 million doses of Moderna vaccine, still in phase three trials.
- Aug. 17: UNC Chapel Hill became the first university to send students home.

#### DEATH TOLL RISES

- Coronavirus became the third leading cause of death in the U.S.
- Discussions began concerning how students could safely return to school, and districts developed plans for inperson instruction, remote learning or hybrid combinations of both.
- Aug. 24: The Radio City Music Hall Rockettes canceled their annual holiday show for 2020.





## MARCH & APRIL

- March 19: California became the first state to issue a stay-at-home order, restricting travel to only necessary outings like doctor appointments and grocery shopping.
- March 26-27: The Senate passed the CARES (Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security) Act, a \$2.2 trillion economic stimulus package.
- April 15: New York City death toll rose to 10,000 and hospitals set up field facilities in tents to handle the overload of cases.
- April 22: The U.S. death toll reached 40.000.



## JULY

- July 2: States reversed their reopening plans as new cases rose to 50,000 a day. Experts warned of a holiday surge and Southern California closed beaches for the Fourth of July.
- July 14: Moderna Therapeutics announced desired immune responses in phase one and two trials of their vaccine.
- July 16: Daily new cases in U.S. set a record at 75,600.
- Juty 21: Vaccines from AstraZeneca showed promise.
- July 27: Moderna began phase three trials and received \$472 million from the U.S. government for development.



## SEPTEMBER

- Sept. 14: Pfizer, a biopharmaceutical company, expanded their phase three vaccine trials.
- Sept. 20: U.S. death tolls reached 200,000.
- Sept. 21: Johnson & Johnson began phase three vaccine trials.

#### PERST VARIANT APPEARS

- Sept. 23: A new, more contagious strain of the COVID virus was identified in the UK.
- Sept. 28: Global deaths surpassed 1,000,000.
- Sept. 30: Disney laid off 28,000 workers as Disneyland remained closed and Disney World was open with restrictions.

## **DECEMBER**

- Oct. 2: President Trump, the first lady and the couple's son Barron all tested positive for COVID-19. The president was hospitalized for three days, while others quarantined at
- home in the White House.

  Oct. 8: A COVID-19 outbreak at the White House infected at least 34 people. County-wide, 39 states saw an increase in new infections.
- Oct. 19: Global cases reached

OCTOBER

 Oct. 23: After halting trials on Oct.
 12 because of adverse reactions,
 Johnson & Johnson resumed research and testing. AstraZeneca, which halted trials of its vaccine in early
 September also later resumed trials.



- Dec. 8: The first vaccine was administered in the UK. Presidentelect Biden promised 100 million shots in his first 100 days in office.
- Dec. 11: The Food and Drug Administration gave emergency approval for the Pfizer vaccine, and the first vaccine administered state-side happened three days later. A second dose was required three weeks later. The first vaccines went to healthcare and front-line workers and people older than 75.

- . The U.S. death toll reached 300,000.
- Dec. 18: Moderna received EUA with the first shot given Dec. 21, followed by a second dose after four weeks.



## FEB. 16-MARCH

- Feb. 16: Variant cases surged, with 1,173 cases of the UK strain in the U.S.

#### **ENTERTAINING RELEASES**

INTRODUCING A DIFFERENT VIBE.

Taylor Swift dropped a surprise record "Folklore" in July, her eighth studio album. Driven by piano and guitar, the songs are more mellow than her previous work. Selling two million copies in the first week, it set a Guinness World Record for the biggest opening day for an album by a female artist on Spotify. QUEEN BEY MADE NEWS with the release of "Black is King" on July 31. Beyoncé's musical film and visual album got its inspiration from "The Lion King: The Gift," an album she recorded after voicing Nala in Disney's remake. "Black is King" focuses on a young African king who is cast out as a baby and returns to reclaim his throne as an adult.





THE DEATH OF GEORGE FLOYD, a 46-year-old Black man in Minneapolis, set off a summer of unrest and clashes between protesters and police. After a convenience store employee called 911 to say Floyd passed a counterfeit \$20 bill, police detained him with an officer kneeling on his neck for more than eight minutes as Floyd repeatedly said he couldn't breathe. Floyd died as a result. "SAY THEIR NAMES" became a rallying cry as protesters took to the streets beginning in late May. A series of Black deaths at the hands of police sparked demonstrations across the nation. A BROADER MOVEMENT, Black Lives Matter, and an examination of systematic racism in America emerged from the death of George Floyd. Demonstrators toppled statues of Confederate figures, NASCAR banned any display of the Confederate flag and Asheville (NC) City Council voted in support of community reparations for Black Asheville. Brands like Aunt Jemima and Uncle Ben's and sports teams such as the Washington Redskins took steps to change their names. IN THE MIDST OF THE BLM MOVEMENT, Georgia Representative John Lewis died of pancreatic cancer in mid-July. Lewis, the son of sharecroppers, was the last surviving speaker from the 1963 March on Washington where Martin Luther King, Jr. delivered his famous "I Have a Dream" speech. Before his funeral and burial in Atlanta, he was honored in Selma, Alabama, where he grew up.











## NATURE

## ON A RAMPAGE

ALTHOUGH THE ATLANTIC HURRICANE SEASON didn't start until June 1, two named tropical storms developed in May, brushing the Carolina coasts. The first hurricane of the season, Hanna, hit Padre Island, Texas, July 25, followed by Isaias which hugged the coasts of Florida and Georgia before making landfall in North Carolina. EXTREME HEAT ALONG THE WEST COAST created a ripe environment for wildfires that spanned from Washington through California and into Arizona. Fires started in Washington in April, continuing through the summer. In Oregon, fires caused Portland to have the worst air quality on earth. California had its largest wildfire season in history, burning more that four million acres and destroying more than 9,000 structures.





THOUSANDS OF PEOPLE participated in á march across the Brooklyn Bridge, closing it down, on July 25. The march condemned the use of federal troops to curb protesters in Portland, Oregon. Demonstrations, mostly peaceful, in support of Black Lives Matter and justice for George Floyd and others continued throughout the summer in cities across the country.



## ANYONE HUNGRY?

MOST SUMMER SPORTS were effectively ended by COVID-19. The French Open and Kentucky Derby both moved to September and baseball season was shortened. But Nathan's Famous hot dog eating contest, a Fourth of July tradition, endured. Joey Chestnut won for the 13th time, downing 75 hot dogs in 10 minutes. Miki Sudo captured the women's prize, eating 48.5.



#### ONE BIG BUG

#### WILDFIRES, RECORD HEAT, TORNADOES

— then came the murder hornets, making their first appearance in the Pacific Northwest in the spring and spotted elsewhere through the summer. The Asian giant hornet, which can grow to two inches, kills up to 50 people in Japan each year and poses a threat to honeybees. Researchers hoped to eradicate them before they become established.

#### SPACEX, A PRIVATE SPACE COMPANY founded by Elon Musk, launched two NASA astronauts into space on its Falcon 9 rocket on May 30. This marked the first time NASA launched its own astronauts in nearly a decade. Since 2011, US astronauts had been sent into space on Russian rockets. While Falcon 9 returned to earth, Crew Dragon carried Bob Behnken and Doug Hurly to the International Space Station where they were scheduled to spend several months.






## GOODBYE, **NOTORIOUS RBG**

SUPREME COURT JUSTICE Ruth Bader Ginsburg died on Sept. 18 at the age of 87. Despite battling multiple forms of cancer for a number of years, she continued to work on the Court until the time of her death. Ginsburg served 27 years on the nation's highest court. Her law career started in the 1970s when she led the fight in the courts for gender equality. In 1993, Bill Clinton nominated her as the second woman on the Supreme Court where she continued to champion women's rights. During her years on the court, she became a role model for women of all ages. She was the subject of a documentary, a biopic and an operetta, earning the moniker "Notorious RBG." After lying in repose outside the Supreme Court, she became the first woman to lie in state at the United States Capitol.



**FANS REACTED WITH SHOCK** at the news that Chadwick Boseman, the star of "Black Panther," had died at the age of 43 on Aug. 29. Boseman had been diagnosed with colon cancer four years earlier. He had not publicly revealed the diagnosis, undergoing surgeries and chemotherapy while continuing to act. A Howard University graduate from South Carolina, he had played small roles on television until his portrayal of Jackie Robinson opposite Harrison Ford in the movie "42" made him a star. In addition to Black Panther and Robinson, he also starred as James Brown and Thurgood Marshall. BTS's SINGLE "DYNAMITE" became the first video watched more than 100 million times in 24 hours on YouTube. The seven-member boy band from South Korea debuted in 2013 as a hip-hop group, but it wasn't until 2017 that they led the K-pop movement into the U.S., breaking

















CARS RACED in front of empty stands at the Indy 500 on Aug. 23. COVID-19 forced the delay from May 24 and caused race organizers to prohibit fans. Takumo Sato took the checkered flag for the second time, with the last five laps run under a caution due to a crash. THE EMMY AWARDS, hosted by Jimmy Kimmel, took place virtually on Sept. 20. Kimmel hosted from the Staples Center in Los Angeles with winners giving speeches from their homes. "Schitt's Creek became the first comedy or drama series to win all four main acting categories in a single year. The show, created by and starring Eugene Levy and his son Dan, also became the first series to win all seven major awards in a single year, sweeping the awards with nine total. LADY GAGA TOOK HOME Artist of the Year honors at the MTV Video Music Awards on Aug. 20. She also won the first-ever Tricon Award which honors a highly accomplished artist across three disciplines. Keke Palmer hosted the show featuring mostly pre-recorded performances. Other winners included The Weekend for Video of the Year and BTS for Best Group. The show was dedicated to Chadwick Boseman who had died two days before.



## WILD, WILD WEATHER

A STATE OF EMERGENCY was declared in California when wildfires caused by lightning, record heat and winds burned, across the state. More than 40 significant wildfires began there in August and September. On Aug. 4, Hurricane Isaias made landfall in North Carolina and, before month's end, Hurricane Laura hit Louisiana as a Category 4 with winds so strong they reversed the flow of the Mississippi River. Even the Midwest was not spared the wrath of Mother Nature as a derecho with 125-mph winds flattened fields, uprooted trees and spawned 21 tornados along a 700-mile stretch as it moved through seven states and into southern Ontario.



## UNREST IN LOUISVILLE

TENSIONS CONTINUED to run high in Louisville, Kentucky, when a grand jury convened in the death of Breonna Taylor indicted only one police officer for wanton endangerment for firing into a neighbor's apartment. No one was charged in Taylor's death. Taylor, a 26-year-old Black EMT, was shot and killed in her apartment when police served a search warrant in March. A judge granted the warrant based on the belief that a former boyfriend had received packages of drugs at Taylor's address. Taylor and her current boyfriend were asleep when police broke down their door. Although the officers involved say they announced, some witnesses and Taylor's boyfriend deny that. The boyfriend, not knowing who was breaking in, fired one shot. Police returned fire, hitting Taylor multiple times. Controversy continued over a possible cover-up and whether the grand jury had been given all the evidence by the district attorney.




#### NATURE NOTES

WRANGLERS REMOVED 5,000 pythons from the Florida Everglades. Volusia County, on Florida's Atlantic Coast, saw its fourth shark attack of the year. West Virginia battled zombie cicadas under the influence of a psychedelic fungus that caused them to infect other insects. On a lighter note: Mei Xiang, a 22-year-old giant panda at the National Zoo in Washington D.C. gave birth to a cub on Aug. 21.

THE LOS ANGELES DODGERS won their first World Series in 32 years on Oct. 20, beating the Tampa Bay Rays 8-3 in Game 6. The 60-game regular season was the shortest in history due to the pandemic, but it led to the longest post-season on record with 16 teams competing. LA shortstop Corey Seager was named World Series MVP. Game 6 set a record for the most strikeouts, and the Dodgers used seven pitchers - the most ever used by a winning team in a nine-inning clincher.



Music Awards bestowed the same honor on Taylor Swift. When the Grammy nominations were announced, Beyoncé set a record with nine, while Swift, Roddy Ricch and Dua Lipa garnered six nominations each. "JEOPARDY!" HOST ALEX TREBEK, who announced his diagnosis of stage 4 pancreatic cancer in March 2019, died Nov. 8 at the age of 80. He taped his final appearance as host on Oct. 29. Trebek hosted the TV show for 37 seasons. Ken Jennings, the highest money winner in game show history, served as the first of several interim hosts while the network sought a new permanent host. October also marked the deaths of rocker Eddie Van Halen and Scottish actor Sean Connery, the original James Bond.

Eric Church was named Artist of the Year at the Country Music Awards, and the American







## DELAYED RESULTS

THE PRESIDENTIAL ELECTION took place on Nov. 3, and voters turned out in record numbers. The results were close enough that several states could not be called. On Nov. 7, Joe Biden reached the required number of 270 electoral votes and became the president-elect. He and vice presidentelect Kamala Harris addressed the nation that night.







the Masters golf tournament with the lowest score in the history of the tournament. Pandemic concerns created a one-of-a-kind Masters: No spectators, no ropes and only one guest for each player. Johnson finished 20-under at 268 with only four bogeys in 72 holes, another record. Tiger Woods, the defending champion, helped him put on his green jacket.
THE ROCK AND ROLL HALL OF FAME welcomed a new group of inductees on Nov. 7. Honorees included The Doobie Brothers (pictured), Depeche Mode, Whitney Houston, Nine Inch Nails, The Notorious B.I.G. and T. Rex. The ceremony was broadcast on HBO after the live ceremony, scheduled for May 2, was cancelled due to the pandemic.

NO FANS LOOKED ON as Dustin Johnson won



PRESIDENT TRUMP sent a tweet on Oct. 2 announcing he had tested positive for COVID-19. He was hospitalized later that day at Walter Reed National Military Medical Center following a dip in his oxygen levels. He returned to the White House three days later after receiving an experimental drug cocktail. The First Lady and son, Barron, also tested positive and quarantined at the White House.

## NEW JUSTICE



WITH THE DEATH of Supreme Court Justice Ruth Bader Ginsberg in September, President Trump nominated Amy Coney Barrett to fill the vacancy. Democrats argued that the position should not be filled before the presidential election, but on Oct. 26, Barrett was confirmed with a 52-48 vote in the Republican-led Senate. The vote marked the first in modern times with no support from the minority party. Barrett, who once clerked for Justice Antonin Scalia, was a professor at the University of Notre Dame Law School for 15 years before her appointment to the 7th US Circuit Court of Appeals in 2017.







## ATHLETIC

DeVONTA SMITH, an Alabama Crimson Tide wide receiver won the 2021 Heisman Trophy. A senior, Smith was the first wide receiver to win the trophy since 1991. He was also named The Associated Press Player of the Year — the first wideout to win that honor. He scored three touchdowns in Alabama's win over Ohio State for the National Championship in the 52-24 game on Jan. 11. BARCELONA SOCCER PLAYER Lionel Messi scored goal number 644 on Dec. 22, breaking Pele's long-held record for the most goals scored for a single club. The Argentinian, a six-time winner of the Ballon d'Or award, was also the highest scorer in the history of La Liga with 451 goals.



AS THE INAUGURATION CEREMONY ends on Jan. 20, newly installed President Joe Biden and his wife, Jill, leave the Capitol Building. Record voter turnout and close counts in a number of battleground states delayed the election results. Biden and the vice president, Kamala Harris, were declared the winners on Nov. 7, four days after election day. LADY GAGA CHATS with Vice President Harris and her husband, Douglas Emhoff, after singing the National Anthem at the inauguration. The election marked a number of firsts, including the first woman, the first African American and the first Indian to hold the office of Vice President. WITH THE COVID PANDEMIC raging, the large crowds that normally witnessed the inauguration were limited. To represent those who could not attend, the Presidential Inauguration Committee installed more than 191,500 state and territory flags on the National Mall. BERNIE SANDERS, the Independent senator from Vermont, created quite a stir and countless memes - with his inaugural mittens. Made from recycled wool and lined with fleece made from recycled plastic, they were given to Sanders by a Vermont elementary teacher. The memes, placed on sweatshirts, t-shirts and stickers, helped raise more than \$1.8 million for charitable organizations in Vermont. PRESENTING HER POEM, "The Hill We Climb," Amanda Gorman became the youngest inaugural poet in U.S. history. A poet and activist, she was named the first National Youth Poet Laureate. Her inaugural poem generated international acclaim, boosting two of her books to best-seller status.

## OF LEGENDS

WE LOST A NUMBER of sports and entertainment legends in January, Larry King, a television and radio host, died at 87. With awards that included a Peabody, an Emmy and 10 Cable ACE Awards, he hosted more than 50,000 interviews. "Hammerin' Hank" Aaron played 23 MLB seasons. Dubbed the Home Run King, he was inducted into baseball's Hall of Fame in 1982. Cicely Tyson, a model and actress, won a Tony in 2013 and two Emmys for her role in "The Autobiography of Miss Jane Pittman." She was 96. Cloris Leachman won eight Daytime Emmys during a career that spanned seven decades. She appeared on "Dancing With the Stars" at the age of 82.



## UNCONVENTIONAL HOLIDAYS






2020 HOLIDAY DINNERS looked different for many families. While some were able to hold multigenerational gatherings, many postponed or sought other ways to celebrate together, avoiding travel and larger groups. AAA estimated that approximately 34 million fewer Americans traveled for December holidays, representing a decrease of nearly 30 percent from 2019.
TIMES SQUARE'S ICONIC BALL DROP took place with a group of about 40 frontline pandemic workers dubbed "Heroes of 2020" by event organizers replacing the usual throngs of revelers. The "New Year's Rockin' Eve" special still aired, complete with the countdown, confetti and live performances by Andra Day, Jennifer Lopez, Pitbull, Gloria Gaynor and others.



#### **GAMESTOP MANIA**

AT THE BEGINNING of January, GameStop shares were selling for \$20. Two weeks later the price was \$483. The increase was fueled by largely rookie traders encouraging one another on Reddit to buy shares. Although the GameStop bubble passed quickly, activity from young traders seemed more lengthy, with 3.7 million downloads of Robinhood, a commission-free trading and investing app, in January.



## MARKING

### MILESTONES

IN LATE SEPTEMBER, the COVID-19 Memorial Project installed 20,000 small flags on the National Mall to commemorate those who had died from the pandemic. At that point, predictions of 240,000 future deaths seemed impossible. But on Feb. 22, the U.S. surpassed 500,000 deaths. President Biden and wife Jill, along with other officials, marked the grim milestone with a candle-lighting ceremony and a moment of silence. Biden also ordered flags at federal buildings flown at half-staff for five days.



## A BLOW TO **TOURISM**







**COVID-19 IMPACTED** tourism in multiple ways. Broadway went dark in March 2020. In September, the closures were extended until 2021, then later pushed to May 30. The eight Smithsonian museums in Washington, D.C. also closed in March. The museums reopened in July and closed again just before Thanksgiving. Both Disney World in Florida and Disneyland in California shut down in March. Disney laid off 28,000 workers in September and another 32,000 in November, Although Disney World reopened to limited numbers in July, Disneyland remained closed a year later.

AS EARLY AS APRIL 2020, the CDC recommended face masks to curb the spread of COVID-19. Each state issued its own requirements, and as many as 35 states mandated masks at some point. After peaking in January 2021, the pandemic began to ebb with the introduction of vaccines. Masks were still required in 30 states at the end of February. THE FDA GRANTED emergency use authorization (EUA) for the Pfizer vaccine on Dec. 11. Just three days later, the first U.S. vaccine was administered. One week later, Moderna received EUA, and their first vaccine given Dec. 22. Both early vaccines required two doses several weeks apart for highest efficacy. Health care and frontline workers, and people older than 75 received vaccine priority. A third vaccine. by Johnson & Johnson, which required only one dose and less extreme storage temperatures, was approved Feb. 27.









**BRINGING A LITTLE** LEVITY to the time of COVID, the citizens of New Orleans created "Yardi Gras" as a way to maintain the spirit of Mardi Gras. Parades and more were cancelled, so many families decorated their homes, some with the help of professional float artists who were temporarily out of work because of the pandemic. According to the mayor - because it's a religious holiday - "Mardi Gras was not cancelled, just different."







## HOLIDAYS AT A DISTANCE

EXPERTS WARNED against gatherings during the holidays to avoid a spike in COVID cases. Shopping mall Santas greeted children from behind face shields and plexiglass. Families shared holiday meals via Zoom. Despite the warnings and precautions, January became the deadliest month in the U.S. for the pandemic. Total deaths surpassed soldier fatalities in WWII. In addition, variants of the virus were identified in three states on Jan. 4. By the one-year anniversary of the first U.S. case on Jan. 20, more 400,000 Americans had died from the virus.

#### **FLAT FANS**

FROM ATHLETES TO SPECTATORS, the pandemic continued to affect sports. Some high schools moved their football seasons to spring. Major sporting events like college bowl games and Super Bowl LV were played with limited fans. The World Series, held at the 40,300-seat capacity Globe Life Park, allowed only 10,550 fans and filled many of the lower empty

seats with cardboard cutouts.



## IN SCHOOL

## OR OUT?





IN JANUARY 2021. the CDC said it was safe for schools to open but controversy continued. Educational plans varied from school to school, district to district and state to state. Plans ranged from in-person instruction - with masks, social distancing and barriers - to remote learning from home, or a hybrid combination of both. Some schools offered both in-person and virtual options and let students and parents decide, while others offered alternate-day plans. Experts, teachers and parents agreed in-person instruction benefitted students the most. By late winter, there were discussions about offering summer classes in some areas.
