

Construction Is Completed and New Technology Advances Instruction Capabilities

As the years have gone by, West Chicago Community High School has changed its appearance many times. The oldest part of the building was erected in 1926, and several additions have been put on since then. The latest changes to the school included the new west wing, computer labs, and remodeling of classrooms, the cafeteria, and the library.

Since the summer of 1998 we had been awaiting the completion of construction, and it finally came as the 2000-2001 year began. The west wing was ready for the use of students and staff after the summer of 1999, but this was not the last phase of construction. After the west wing was usable the rest of the existing building got completely new HVAC and technology infrastructure. Portions of the building were closed off for months while renovations took place. The growing student population gave great purpose to the construction.

With new, high-technology classrooms in place we had more space for students. The construction workers strove to make our school look and function better. As the 2000-2001

school year began all areas of the building were once again open, though contractors still roamed the hallways and rooms as they tried to "balance" the highly sophisticated heating, cooling, and alarm systems.

The new fire detectors throughout the building were of particular note as various heat, dust, and smoke events set off the alarms with unusual frequency. We trudged out outside, sometimes into cold, rain, or snow, all too often as the year wore on. The West Chicago Fire Department made regular visits as the alarms sounded, though we had often gotten the all-clear and returned to the building before their arrival.

The whole school had been technologically improved with new ventilation systems and high-efficiency light fixtures that made the school workplace more comfortable. As we traveled through the halls of Community High School we knew that our school had improved for us.

With construction and renovation, the school took on a new image for the future.

All the new technology at West Chicago Community High School allowed more opportunities and created a 21st Century workplace for the students and staff. The updated programs like Pagemaker 6.5, AutoCAD 2000, and 3D Studio VIZ on the new computers gave students in the school the chance to improve the quality of their work.

Throughout the building new television sets and 14 computer labs (as of Summer 2001) gave teachers more options for teaching their classes. All of this new technology allowed students easy access to information and computing power that was unthought of even ten years previously. For instance, the Challenge and Wildcat Chronicle became better quality products because of the new computers and programs available to their staffs. After spending about \$1.2 million on technology, we became one of the most technologically advanced schools in the nation.




The modernized drafting room provided Mechanical Drawing, Architectural Drawing, and Advanced Drawing students updated computer programs and new drafting tables.

What if we held an election and nobody won?

Al Gore and George W. Bush fought each other nearly to a draw, and for a while it looked like the election might never end.

Tuesday, November 7, election day 2000, got stretched out a bit—into December, in fact. In what will be remembered as one of the most unusual elections in American history, no one knew who'd won the presidency until December, when the United States Supreme Court handed down a ruling that effectively ended ongoing recounts and contests of the election results in one state: Florida. George W. Bush was finally named president-elect when Al Gore conceded the election that evening.


Of course, Gore had conceded the election once before, on election night, but early in the morning of November 8, he called Bush back to retract his concession. Although the networks had called Florida and its electoral votes for Gore early on the evening of the seventh, as the night wore on they moved that state back into the "too close to call" column. Later, Florida was called for Bush, but in the wee hours of the eighth, as Al Gore was en route to deliver his concession speech to campaign workers and supporters at his Tennessee headquarters, the state was again listed as "too close to call." By daybreak on the eighth it had become evident that no one knew who had won Florida, and both candidates needed Florida's electoral votes to get a majority in the electoral college, that peculiar constitutional institution which elects our presidents.

As the Florida debacle unfolded, one thing became very evident: the election laws, processes, and technology in place in Florida were not up to the task of quickly and clearly determining a winner in a presidential election that, depending upon the count looked at, came down to less than several hundred votes. Florida officials and election workers, many of them volunteers, counted, recounted, stopped counting when one judge ruled, started counting again when the Florida Supreme Court weighed in, stopped again, started again...it seemed like it might never end.

Thanksgiving came and went, then December started, and but for a sharply divided final ruling of the United States Supreme Court, the counting might still have been going on and

being challenged at Christmas.

The controversies of the Florida election process were innumerable. Most of them related to how to count votes on the punch-card ballots used by many counties in the state. The election raised constitutional issues as to whether every voter had been provided equal protection under the law and whether some voters had actually been disenfranchised by the system in place. In Miami-Dade County, the layout of the so-called "butterfly ballot" was questioned as confusing to voters. In Miami-Dade, Reform Party candidate Patrick Buchanan, received a greatly disproportionate number of votes as compared to any other county in the state, and after the election he said he



thought the ballot confusion had probably caused some voters who thought they were voting for Al Gore to vote for him in error.

Initially it was thought that counties where punch-card ballots were used were the most problematic, but the Chicago Tribune reported in January that considerable irregularities were also found in counties where optical scan ballots were used.

A consortium of major newspapers, including the Chicago Tribune, began a study of ballots throughout Florida immediately after Bush was declared the winner of the election. Preliminary results showed that many ballots—both optical scan and punch-card—which showed the clear intent of the voter were rejected or never counted by local election officials. Although the initial findings of the study indicated that inclusion of these ballots would have raised the vote count for both Bush and Gore, they also revealed that in almost every

county Gore would have gained more votes than Bush.

The irregularities of the Florida election were perhaps most evident in the disparity found between poorer, mostly African-American precincts and wealthier, mostly white precincts. It was widely reported that in one county one out of every three ballots was rejected in predominately African-American precincts, while only one out of every fourteen ballots was rejected in mostly white precincts.

Some voters complained that when they discovered they had made an error on their ballots election judges refused to give them new ballots in spite of state law requiring them to do so. Former President Jimmy Carter, who had been involved as an observer



in many other nations' elections, was reported to have said that, had those countries had the election process problems apparent in Florida, his organization would have refused to participate in the election.

In the final analysis, while George W. Bush won the electoral college by one vote, Al Gore had received more than half a million more votes nationwide than Bush. In fact, Al Gore racked up the second highest vote tally in American history, second only to Ronald Reagan. Nonetheless, Bush was declared the winner.

In a strange twist of irony, when members of Congress rose to object to the inclusion of Florida's electoral votes in the election of the new president, it was Vice President Al Gore, presiding as President of the Senate, who ruled those challenges out of order, confirming the election of George W. Bush. Bush was inaugurated as president on January 20, 2001, and by that time it had become appar-

ent there would never be a definitive vote count in Florida. The best that could be hoped for was a tally which would include properly cast and counted ballots; ballots showing the clear intent of the voter, some of which had been counted in the official election results and some of which had not; and ballots not showing the clear intent of the voter.

As the new year got under way, the National Association of Secretaries of State met, and at the top of their agenda was consideration of how to reform the voting process so the Florida election debacle would not be repeated. Florida's state legislature vowed that all punch-card voting would be replaced by state-of-the-art optical machines by the next presidential election. All agreed, however, that a perfect system would probably be unachievable because our government is made up of the people, and as people we are fallible. Some people, be they voters or election judges, will inevitably make mistakes even with the best possible systems in place.

In sum, it was a most peculiar year in politics!

Prior to the start of the 2000-2001 school year, President Bill Clinton survived an impeachment trial regarding the deplorable mistakes in his personal life. Then came the presidential election mess. Almost, overshadowed by all of this was the election of Hillary Rodham Clinton as a United States Senator from New York. The former First Lady became the first wife of a President to seek and hold an elected office in her own right.

While President George W. Bush began his term with the Republicans in control of both houses of Congress, the majority was slim in the House of Representatives and was dependent on Vice President Dick Cheney's vote in the Senate. This changed in June, 2001 when previously Republican Senator James Jeffords of Vermont declared himself an Independent and announced he would vote with the Democrats to give them control of the Senate. These unprecedented events made for a very curious political year.

The Wildcat Vote

While most high school students couldn't vote, that didn't mean they didn't have opinions about who should be president and why. The Challenge staff was curious about student thoughts on the election, and here's what we found out in a pre-election survey. 179 students responded to our questionnaire. 22 of those were freshmen, 28 sophomores, 52 juniors, and 77 seniors. 78 of the respondents were male, and 101 were female.

When asked their party affiliation, 26% of respondents said they were Democrats, while 34.6% said they were Republicans. 17.7% listed themselves as independents, and 22% said they were "other." Students were asked what factor had most influenced their party identification. The strongest influence was family tradition, listed by 35% of students. 29% of students said their own research led to their affiliation, and 26% said personal experience was the strongest agent in their party identification.

In addition, 70% of students surveyed said a candidate's party affiliation was either "very important" or "somewhat important" in whether they would vote for the candidate. A candidate's choice of running mate, however, seemed more important to students as 76% ranked that decision as "very important" or "somewhat important." Only 46% of students surveyed thought a candidate's probable choice of Supreme Court justices was either "very important" or "somewhat important" in choosing a president.

Students were also asked to consider what about the candidate would be most important in deciding for whom to vote. 35% said policy would be the most important factor. Nearly 32% said leadership ability would be most important, and 15% said personality would most influence their choice. Only 12.7% indicated a candidate's morality would be the number one factor in deciding their vote, and affiliation with a religion and governing experience were each chosen by only 2.5% of students as the most important thing about a candidate.

Using a continuum from "very unimportant" to "very important," students were also asked to rate the importance of a candidate's position on a variety of issues. Tax policy and education policy were clearly high on students' agendas; each was marked "very important" by 114 students. Close behind was civil rights policy, marked "very important" by 109 respondents. 103 students marked abortion policy, gun control policy, and environmental policy as "very important" in contributing to their voting decisions. Of lesser importance to students were candidate positions on government spending, health care, military spending, military deployment, and social security.

We were also curious about how many students would actually vote in the election if they had the chance. 59% said they would vote for sure if they were allowed to, 15.9% said they would probably vote, 15.9% said they might vote, 3.4% said they would probably not vote, and 5.7% said they were sure they would not vote. Interestingly, when broken down by gender, males appeared to be significantly less likely to vote than females. While 78% of females said they would probably vote or would vote for sure, only 70.8% of males responded in the same way.







In June of 2001, seven pillars of the faculty retired. Their departure was notable because of the standard of excellence each had achieved during their time in our school.

Each of these teachers was known to their students and colleagues for their unique contributions to our school, our students, and our community. It would be impossible to list all of the the student activities and teaching accomplishments of these seven people. Each of them taught because of their love of kids and belief in the value of education. Upon their departure, the faculty was unanimous that each retiree left huge paw prints to fill.

With heavy hearts but very best wishes, the employees of the district bid farewell to these seven teachers at a luncheon on June 8, 2001.



Dr. Lawrence McNamara
In his 33 years at West Chicago, Dr. McNamara was chairperson of the Basic Skills Department and taught various English courses. McNamara served as president of the teachers' association from 1979-1980. He also taughtreading education courses at Aurora University and Northern Illinois University. He came to teaching after working for three years at Dun and Bradstreet. Dr. McNamara was known for his dedication to his students, the real-life, business-like tenor of his teaching, and his easy-going sense of humor.

Ms. Vera Sorensen
Ms. Sorensen came to West Chicago at a time when she was required to sign a loyalty oath attesting to the fact that she had never been a member of the Communist Party in order to be hired. She taught all levels of mathematics, and for the last year and a half of her career she served as a teacher of homebound students and as a mathematics specialist in the tutoring program. Ms. Sorensen's dedication to her students was unlimited, and she was known by her colleagues as a teacher who strove for high standards in her classroom.

Mrs. Carol Walksler
Mrs. Walksler taught in the Science Department for many years, and in recent years became most noted for her work in the horticulture and botany courses. Many of her students went on to careers in these fields. She could most often be found digging in a pot of dirt or supervising student projects in her classroom, and the plants and flowers grown by her students often graced the grounds and special events of the school. Mrs. Walksler served for a time as chairperson of the Science Department.

Ms. Gail George
Ms. George put in 36 years at West Chicago, teaching physical and drivers' education, coaching, and working as assistant athletic director and interim athletic director. An unstinting supporter of We-Go athletic programs, cheerfulness, determination, resilience, and dedication characterized her every moment. Ms. George saw the growth of girls' athletic opportunities from the Girls' Athletic Association into the full interscholastic sports program now in place. Upon retirement she planned to spend time in Michigan and Wisconsin.



Ms. LaVora Singleton
Ms. Singleton began teaching in 1967. She taught physical education at West Chicago, and coached a number of girls' sports, including Badminton for the last several years of her career. She served as president of the teachers' association from 1987 to 1993, and was known for her no-nonsense but deeply caring approach to teaching. As a senior member of the faculty, she served as a role-model to newer teachers and encouraged them to become as involved as possible in their profession.



Mr. George Strecker
Mr. Strecker spent 35 years in West Chicago's Social Studies Department. As chairperson of that department, he was a driving force behind the creation of the interdisciplinary courses offered by the school. He served as teachers' association president in 1980-81, and was constantly involved in discussions and plans to improve the offerings of the school. Mr. Strecker was known for his years of competition with Mr. Steve Arnold to see who could ride his bike to school the most days each year.



Mrs. Carol Wolf
Known fondly as "Wolfie" to some of her English Department colleagues, Mrs. Wolf taught for 30 years, 21 of those at West Chicago. Wolf was particularly noted for her dedication to and ability to work with students who had difficulty in mastering the language arts. Her ability to understand and think like her students was invaluable as she planned her classes. Mrs. Wolf was the social director for the English Department, a post she handed to Ms. Allie Wolf upon retiring. Creativity and patience were the hallmarks of her work.











They also sponsored a golf cart driving course where students put on goggles which simulated vision impairment while drunk. Students had a very difficult time negotiating the course, even in the one-speed golf cart.

Peer Listeners/Helpers is a group of volunteers which helps other students negotiate the High School experience. At the beginning of the year, during registration, they helped freshmen find their classes. In the winter the peer

listeners went to the middle school to meet some of the students and tell them about high school life. Throughout the year they helped with DARE, Drug Abuse Resistance Education, to keep kids off of drugs and to keep them off of the streets. Peer Helpers also assisted students with special needs on a daily basis.

Key Club held many service events in '00-'01, from the blood drive to sending a cow to Bangladesh. The first event was the blood drive, held on November 14th. "Even though we didn't reach the goal that was set, we were really close. It was good that we helped give the hospitals the blood they need," said Melissa Garcia.

In the weeks before spring break Key Club made an effort to earn \$500 to send a cow to Bangladesh. Unfortunately, only a partial cow was earned instead of an entire cow. "We combined money with another school to be able to get the cow for Bangladesh," said Garcia.















Success came on all levels in all forms. The freshmen were able to capture victories and imprint the idea of training and discipline on its newcomers to the sport. JV advanced their

















Even though the team ended up in last place in the DVC, much needed experience was gained throughout the season.





man season.


The lack of numbers led to some difficulties later in the season when some players were sidelined due to injuries and conflicts with other extra-curricular activities.





doing the hurdles, fell, then got up and kept running - and his shirt fell off," Jon Lim reminisced. Through determination and the love of the sport, the team made the best of small mistakes and succeeded in capturing many PRs (personal records, or personal bests) and hardware (medals and trophies).

"The throw I won't forget is Wyatt Schuyler's discus throw at the Geneva Invitational. It was an unexpected record that I thought he would get later in the year," Coach Zeitler, shotput and discus specialist, said. He helped send Wyatt Schuyler into the record books for breaking the sophomore record in discus, and later in the shot put. He threw a 140' 11" in discus and a 52' 1.5" in the shotput.

Continuing to excel even when the chips were down was a staple of West Chicago's Boys Track and Field Team, and they made winning against all odds a new tradition to follow. Collectively, the guys ran faster, threw further, jumped higher, and leapt further than they ever had before. Medals and ribbons were worth just as much as broken records, be they for a meet, the school, or individual. Success rarely eluded them and full effort never did. It was a season of which all could be proud.



What, you run? The ladycats track team answers this with a resounding "YES!" and with medals, records, and state performances to back up their answer.

This year the team grew in size, despite the lack of seniors. "Track helps you get in shape and you see yourself improve more than you thought you would. We are always having fun and everyone really gets to know each other," Amanda Weir said of her first season. "I'll never forget the 55 meter hurdles during Indoor! The young team helped earn points from field events to sprints to long distances, and looked to make a very promising team in the years to come.

impressed with the competitiveness of our team. It was great to hear other coaches be in shock at our level," Assistant Coach Lisa Simon added. The end of indoor gave way to a hopeful outdoor season.

The meets yielded many personal best jumps and runs and broken records. Girls' pole vault was added as an event this year, with Amy Infanger setting the record. Results were smashed in the 400 and 100 by Laura Baumrucker, in the 200 by Jessica Cwiak, in the 3200 by Katy Kostal, in the 4x200m 4x100m, and in the 800 medley relays. 






