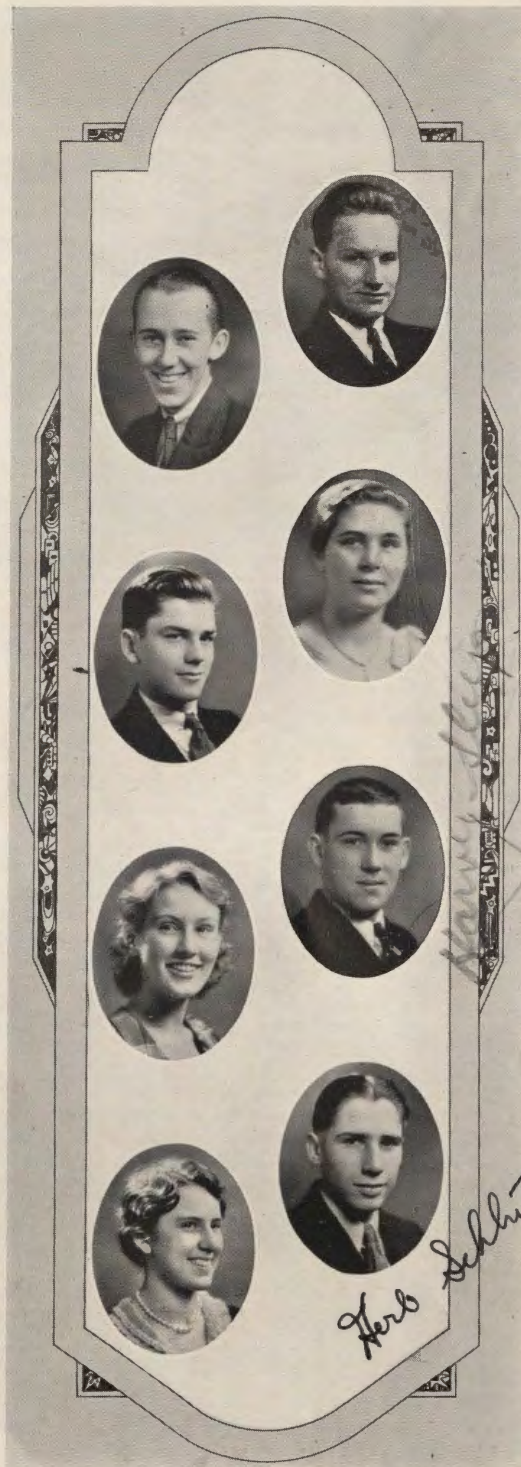

HEAVYWEIGHT BASKETBALL---1932

The basketball season of 1932 was the most successful ever witnessed by a Blue and White cage team. Although they made a comparatively poor showing in the conference at the start of the season, they came back strong toward the end.

Every year, since Coach Gamble has taken charge, our athletic teams get better. Coach Gamble took charge of athletics in the fall of 1929 and our showings since then prove his worth as a coach. In 1930 West Chicago placed in a fourth position tie with Maine in Basketball. In 1931 West Chicago placed third. In 1932 we won the District Championship and went on to the Sectional to be beaten in the semi-finals by Morton High of Cicero, who later proved to be State Champions.

West Chicago opened its 1931-32 basketball season at De Kalb by taking the small end of a 23-14 score. The next game was on December 11 when we met Glenbard on the home floor and were defeated again.

The Blue and White quintet just couldn't get going until December 18 when they downed Downers Grove by a score of 27-19. They slumped again on January 8 when they met Hinsdale and were badly beaten 31-12.

On the next night, January 9, they turned the tables on De Kalb by taking a double header from them, the heavy-weight score being 27-25.

In the next two games, West Chicago lost a hard game and won a hard game, defeating Maine 25-24 and losing to York in overtime period 30-27. The next game was with Riverside where they again dropped a double header. They experienced a repeater on the next night January 30, when they again dropped a double header the heavies losing 27-13. West Chicago dropped its last three Conference games by small scores.

The heavyweight squad was sorely shaken by making such a poor showing in the West Suburban Conference and determined to make a much better showing in the fight for the District Championship.

They defeated West Aurora 26-7 to enter the semi-finals. Big Rock was their next victim falling to the tune of 30-22. In the finals We-Go met and defeated Batavia in a very exciting game by the score of 32 to 30.

With the District Championship safely tucked away, We-Go entered the sectional tournament at Joliet and defeated Waukegan in the first game by a score of 29-20. Morton High of Cicero came along however, to defeat We-Go in the next game 33-18.

A great deal must be said for this year's heavyweight team as it deserves it. A group of hard fighting fellows with the courage and ability to do things when things look blackest deserves all the credit possible!

The We-Go lightweights started their cage season of 1931-32 on December 5. Under the leadership of Coach Johnson, the team cooperated and worked very smoothly throughout the season. The team placed fifth in the West Suburban Conference which is a very big improvement over the previous years.

The season opened December 5, with the We-Go ponies falling to the DeKalb cagers 14 to 8 on the latter's floor. The regular conference schedule began on December 11, and the We-Go cagers started out by upsetting the Glenbard five 14-9, on We-Go home floor. The next game proved to be a thrilling affair with We-Go losing to Downers Grove by a mere two points, 26-24. The We-Go ponies took their third upset at Hinsdale, losing 39-9.

January 9 marked the second non-conference game in which the local boys were victorious over the DeKalb ponies 23-17 on the We-Go court. Following this victory, We-Go clashed with Maine on the local court, losing 11-15. After finishing these home games, the We-Go lights traveled eastward to York where they took a trimming, 13-11. This seemed to hit the We-Go boys rather hard, for they turned around and lost to Riverside 18-8, and then to Glenbard on their return game 15-8.

The Blue and White lads never forgot their fall to Downers Grove in the early part of the season, and when they met Downers, the second time, they played a determined brand of basketball, winning 22-19. The following game found We-Go ponies losing to the Hinsdale cagers on the We-Go court 30-13. February 13 proved to be an unlucky day for the We-Go lads, for they dropped to Maine on Maine's floor 15-11. Following this defeat the boys turned around and were victorious over the York team on the We-Go floor 27-24. The final conference game for the Blue and White lightweight team was played on February 26. This final game took place on the Riverside floor where We-Go met defeat 19-17.

The We-Go lights played in a lightweight tournament for the first time in the history of the school. This tournament was held at Wheaton Community High School, and the We-Go cagers lost a very heartbreaking game to Wheaton in an overtime period 20-15. HEAVYWEIGHT FOOTBALL

The 1931-32 athletic season started the opening day of school when coaches Gamble and Johnson put in their first call for the fall sport.

About twenty two heavy weights reported for their togs that afternoon, eight of them being veterans from the previous year aggregation.

With but three weeks practice until the first pre-season game, the We-Go team tackled Batavia which proved to be a victory for them, with the narrowest of margins, 7-6. Both touchdowns were the result of blocked punts.

West Chicago then traveled to Joliet to play a night game. The team was being beaten quite severely at half time, but never gave up hope of putting a touch-down across. They did in the final period. Bill Weber received a pass from Buss on our forty-five yard line on which he scored. In the same manner Bill scored the extra point.

The next game opened up our conference season. This game was played with York on the local gridiron in a down pour of rain. The field was like a sea of mud, but the We-Go squad did not mind it a bit after the game because they came out on the large end of a 2-0 score. This safety was the result of Wolff's blocking a punt, and Weber's falling on it beyond the goal line.

They next played at Riverside and were defeated 18-0 in a hard fought game.

Maine and Downers Grove also took the large end of the scores when they played with West Chicago.

November 7, eleven boys played their last local game. This was with Glenbard. West Chicago was the only conference team to score against them, only to go down to defeat 16-7 in one of the best played games of the year. Glenbard later won the conference championship.

Our last game of the year was played at Hinsdale on a field of muck and mire. In this game the touch-down and point after touch-down were scored by the same fellow, Royal "Mike" Day. This was the only tally of the game.

Fight and drive of "Bob" Vergie and "Jerry" Weber were never equalled by any one in the conference.

The fight of the whole team was shown at Downers Grove, when Downers led 21-0 at half time, and then We-Go held them scoreless the second half.

The lightweight team is just a stamping ground for the heavies, because very few of them ever put more than one year in with the lights in learning the fundamentals, and then they are graduated to the varsity team.

There will be only a few boys on the lightweight team next year who have ever played football before. Seventeen of last year's team will go up to the heavies next year.

Next year's team will compare a little more in size with that of other schools of the conference, because the lightweight limit has been lowered from 135 pounds to 130 pounds.
